# Multi-Spacecraft Observations of A Transition Region Reconnection Event

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### Abstract



While flares are among the most consequential manifestations of solar activity, there is much to learn by observing smaller reconnection events in the solar transition region (TR). In particular, the TR environment offers high emission measure and a short line-of-sight integration, allowing detailed and relatively uncluttered direct observations of the reconnection process. We report a well-resolved reconnection event in the solar transition region observed by IRIS on April 15, 2014. The event is resolved spatially and temporally in Si IV slit jaw images as a series of brightenings in a ribbon of pre-existing loops. In the spectra we see a complex, evolving velocity field indicated by blueshifts, redshifts, and nonthermal line broadenings. An associated footpoint region, resembling a flare ribbon, shows a strong redshift in Si IV. Imaging from AIA shows nearly simultaneous manifestation in all bands, suggesting localized heating. Magnetic field measurements from Hinode and HMI provide insight into the magnetic configuration of this event. After considering several alternatives, we interpret the data as a direct observation of reconnection in a TR current sheet. Implications are discussed for models of reconnection in the solar atmosphere.

### **Motivation**



Reconnection is central to our interpretation of flares and heating yet, in a sense, elusive.

- Observations of coronal reconnection are mainly indirect, e.g. ribbons, outflows, postflare loops.
- The reconnection region in the corona has low emission measure and is often obscured line-of-sight confusion.
- Consider the transition region:
  - High event rate (explosive events)
  - High density in the reconnection region
  - Minimal LOS confusion
- Can we resolve a reconnection region in the TR?

## **AIA Light Curves**





All channels brighten simultaneously. Multithermal, perhaps far from ionization equilibrium.

Most of the quantity  $\langle Iv^2 \rangle / \langle I \rangle$  is in sub-pixel scales. However, fastest rise times ( $\sim 3 \,\mathrm{s}$ ) at scales of  $\sim 1$ ".



### Back of Envelope...



Fastest-growing mode  $k_M \sim 1/1$ ", apparent growth rate  $\omega_M = 0.3 \, {
m s}^{-1}$ . In linear tearing mode theory,<sup>1</sup>,

$$k_M\,l\,L_u^{1/4} = 1.4, \qquad \omega_M\,l^2 = 0.6\,\eta\,L_u^{1/2},$$

Where l is current sheet thickness,  $L_u = l v_A \eta^{-1}$  is the Lundquist number, and  $\eta$  is resistivity.

Caveats:

- What we observe is likely nonlinear development.
- $\langle Iv^2 \rangle / \langle I \rangle$  introduces time dependence through I(y,t); is this appropriate for estimating rise-time  $\omega_M$ ? <sup>1</sup>Furth *et al.* (1963); see Priest & Forbes (2000).



### Conclusions



- Reconnection can be observed directly in the TR. There are many similar events!
   We interpret this event as tearing mode,
- 2. We interpret this event as tearing mod resolved in space and time.
- 3. Most of the nonthermal  $\langle Iv^2 \rangle / \langle I \rangle$  is at scales smaller than a pixel.
- 4. Rise times for  $\langle Iv^2 \rangle / \langle I \rangle$  at large scales are faster than at small scales.
- 5. We aim to estimate things like  $L_u, l, \eta$  (TBD).
- 6. Quantitative interpretation may require consideration of nonlinear evolution.
