Fermi LAT as solar observatory

- High sensitivity above 100MeV
- Wide Field of View
- Observes the entire sky every 2 orbits:
 - Sun in the FoV about 30min every 3 hours
- Adapting the pointing strategy to high solar activity period



- Intense X-ray flux: pile-up in the ACD \Rightarrow γ -ray suppression.
 - Recover the signal with looser selection technique: LAT Low Energy events (LLE)

- Not all flares are bright X-ray flares.
- Different types of emission:
 - Impulsive (duration \leq 1 min)
 - Sustained
 - Delayed
- All flares are associated with fairly fast CMEs

Astronomy Picture Of the Day:

On March 7, the Sun was 100 times brighter than the Vela pulsar (the brightest steady y-ray source).

GOES flares: X5.4 (peak at 00:40 UT) X1.3 (peak at 01:23 UT)

Preliminary detection by the *Fermi* GBM but analysis has not yet been finalized

High energy y-ray spectrum

- Detection up to 4GeV (2012 flare)
- Consistent with pion decay template (assuming power-law proton distribution; based on Murphy et al. 1987)
- Electron bremsstrahlung possible with a cutoff

 First observations of spectral evolution in y rays:
 Hard to soft

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Localization of the γ rays

- Time integrated localization
- Consistent with the flare site

 Way to exclude contribution of other flares at other sites Wed 07 Mar 2012 00:30:0.000

- Time resolved

- All sites are consistent with the flare site - *Hint* of an evolution (?)

- Total energy in y rays is much less than in HXR (~ 7x10²² erg - 200x less than between 20-300keV)
- Leptonic scenario seems unlikely :
 - Brem. requires >100MeV electrons whose lifetime is ~10s thru synchrotron losses [maybe more in low B fields - large loop]
 - High energy electrons would lose most of their energy in sub-mm, far IR via synchrotron
- Hadronic scenario:
 - in good agreement with data
 - requires modest number of accelerated protons (~ 10³⁴ protons >30MeV - 10x less than SEP protons)

Possible acceleration mechanism

- Initial acceleration and trapping -Coulomb losses for protons would induce a hardening
- Continuous acceleration seems more plausible

- CME shock accelerates SEPs
- Accelerated particles transport back to Sun surface [emission site] (e.g. Murphy et al. 1987, Cliver et al. 1993)

A new era in the highest energy study of solar flares



- Fermi LAT observations reveals new temporal and spectral properties of high energy particles accelerated in solar flares.
- High energy y-ray emission is more common than previously observed - even for modest X-ray flares: 18 flares so far.
- Long sustained y-ray emission raises a lot of questions on acceleration scenarios.

The LAT real view





The LAT has 16 towers of particle detectors, seen here before the installation of the Anticoincidence Detector. Each tower contains a Tracker module and a Calorimeter module. The Data Acquisition System is located underneath the towers.







Gamma-ray Burst Monitor



- 12 low-energy sodium iodide detectors
 - 8 keV (X-ray) 1 MeV (gamma)
 - 3 on each corner of the LAT -> full sky coverage.
- 2 high-energy detectors: bismuth germanate
 - 150 keV 30 MeV
 - good overlap with the low- energy detectors at the bottom end of the gamma-ray energy range, and with the LAT at the high end.
- Trigger System on Transient
- Onboard Processing and Repointing of whole spacecraft to source of interest

y rays from the quiet Sun

- Cosmic-ray interactions with the sun:
 - Hadronic showers in the solar atmosphere (Seckel 91,Thompson 97)
 - Inverse Compton of electrons and solar radiation field (Moskalenko et al. 2006, Orlando & Strong 2007, 2008)
- Fermi LAT detection and separation of both COMPONENTS (Abdo et al. 2011)







y rays in the impulsive phase

2010 June 12 flare

- GOES M2 class
- Hard Xray and y rays lasted for~ 50s
- LLE analysis
- Localization
 consistent with the Sun
- No evidence of sustained emission

2010 June 12 spectral analysis

- Electron bremsstrahlung dominates < 1MeV
 - Several electron populations
- Nuclear lines
- High energy component up to 400 MeV: modeled by Pion decay or electron brem.

2010 June 12 flare

- High-energy y rays are delayed by a few seconds:
 - ~3 sec at onset and ~10 sec at the peak time.
 - Similar 'double peak' structure
- Indicate a build-up process for >100MeV electrons or protons

2011 March 7 flare

- GOES M3.7 class
- Impulsive phase not visible
- No detection of HXR above 300 keV
- SEPs
- ~13 h. detection
 (peak reached 6 h. after impulsive phase)
