Magnetic Carpet: Observations



SDO/HMI: 73,000x73,000 km, 6 hours

- Small-scale photospheric magnetic field of quiet Sun.
- Motions dominated by supergranulation.
- Flux evolves via emergence, cancellation, coalescence, fragmentation.
- Flux: 10¹⁵ 10¹⁹ Mx
 Diameter: few thousand km
 Lifespan: minutes to hours

Magnetic Carpet: Model

A two-component model:

- 2D model: realistic model for photospheric evolution of magnetic carpet.
- 3D model: continuous evolution of non-linear force-free corona, driven by photospheric boundary motions.



Photospheric Model: Ingredients

• Steady supergranular flow profile:

$$\mathbf{v}(\mathbf{r}) = A_0 r \exp\left\{\frac{-r^2}{r_0^2}\right\}$$

- Peak flow 0.5 km/s.
- Random motions representing granulation.
- Periodic in x and y.
- Includes emergence, cancellation, coalescence and fragmentation.



Photospheric Model: Ingredients

• Probability distribution for newly emerging bipoles (Thornton and Parnell, 2010) (Mx⁻¹ cm⁻² day⁻¹):

$$N(\phi) = \frac{n_0}{\phi_0} \left(\frac{\phi}{\phi_0}\right)^{-\alpha}$$

• Number of bipoles emerging in the range $[\phi_1, \phi_2]$ Mx, (cm⁻² day⁻¹):

$$\int_{\phi_1}^{\phi_2} \frac{n_0}{\phi_0} \left(\frac{\phi}{\phi_0}\right)^{-\alpha} d\phi = \frac{n_0}{1-\alpha} \left[\left(\frac{\phi}{\phi_0}\right)^{1-\alpha} \right]_{\phi_1}^{\phi_2}$$



Log-log plot of frequency of emergence against flux emerged for a 5 hour sequence of Hinode/SOT magnetograms.

Slope: $-\alpha = -2.74$

Photospheric Model: Results



- Model reaches steady state after ~ 24 hours. (Emergence rate ≈ cancellation rate, Mx cm⁻² s⁻¹)
- Formation of a magnetic network.
- Mean magnetic field \sim 6 7 G.
- Photospheric recycle time: 1.48 hours
 (1 – 2 hours, Hagenaar et al. 2008)
- Average lifespan of flux element: 10 minutes
- $(1 20 \text{ mins}, \text{mean } 2.9 \pm 2.0 \text{ mins}, \text{Zhou et al. } 2010)$
- Max. lifespan of flux element: 3 – 4 hours
 (Ephemeral regions, mean lifespan ~ 4.4 hours, Harvey and Martin, 1973)

Coronal Model

- Magnetofriction (van Ballegooijen, Priest and Mackay, 2000).
- Photospheric boundary driven by synthetic magnetograms from 2D model.



Other studies: global corona (Yeates et al. 2008), active region (Mackay et al. 2011, Gibb et al. 2013), small-scale coronal field (Meyer et al. 2012).

Coronal Model: Setup

- 48 hr series of synthetic magnetograms
- 120 168 hr model has reached a steady state
- 1 min between magnetograms
- 50 x 50 x 25 Mm (resolution: 512 x 512 x 256)
- 500 relaxation steps between each frame (0.12 s)
- Four strengths of overlying field: 0 G, 1 G, 3 G and 10 G

Free Magnetic Energy

• Free magnetic energy:

 $E_{\rm f}(t) = \int_{V} \frac{B_{\rm np}^2 - B_{\rm p}^2}{8\pi} {\rm d}V$



- Green: 0 G Blue: 3 G
- Black: 1 G Red: 10 G



Free Magnetic Energy Density

• Free magnetic energy density:

$$E_{\rm f}(x,y) = \Delta x \Delta y \int_{z_{\rm min}}^{z_{\rm max}} \frac{B_{\rm np}(x,y,z)^2 - B_{\rm p}(x,y,z)^2}{8\pi} dz$$



White patches: $B_{np}^{2} > B_{p}^{2}$

Black patches: $B_{np}^2 < B_p^2$

Free Magnetic Energy Density









Energy Dissipated

• Rate of change of magnetic energy: $\frac{\mathrm{d}W}{\mathrm{d}t} = \frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d}t} \left(\int_{V} \frac{B^{2}}{8\pi} \mathrm{d}V \right) = \int_{S} \mathbf{I} \cdot d\mathbf{S} - \int_{V} Q \mathrm{d}V$

• Energy dissipated:

$$Q = \frac{B^2}{4\pi} (\nu |\mathbf{v}|^2 + \eta_4 |\nabla \alpha|)$$

$$Q = \frac{B^2}{4\pi} (\nu |\mathbf{v}|^2 + \eta_4 |\nabla \alpha|)$$

Conclusions

- 2D model successfully reproduces many observed properties of magnetic carpet.
- Continuous evolution of coronal magnetic field -> connectivity maintained -> buildup of free magnetic energy.
- Sufficient free energy to explain small-scale, impulsive events such as nanoflares ($\sim 10^{24}$ erg).
- Free energy stored low down, along twisted, closed connections between many magnetic features.
- Energy dissipation is greatest where magnetic field is strong (i.e. near the sources) and at sites of changing magnetic topology.

Current/Future Work

• Improve 2D model: e.g. time-evolving supergranules, fragmentation dependent on underlying flow...



- Check synthetic magnetograms satisfy power-law flux distribution.
- Emergence down to much smaller scales: do we still obtain a power-law distribution?
- Global quiet Sun simulations: grand minimum Sun.
- Coronal simulations: how do photospheric events (e.g. cancellation) affect the model corona?
