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Introduction

- Field-aligned currents (FACs) are the currents flowing into and out of the ionosphere which connect to the magnetosphere. They provide an essential linkage between the solar wind-magnetosphere system and the ionosphere.
- The distribution and variability of FACs determine ionospheric Joule heating rate, and affect the density and composition of the neutral atmosphere.
- Since the detection of the first FAC signatures [*Zmuda et al., 1966*], many studies have been dedicated to the characterization of FACs [*e.g., lijima and Potemra, 1976, 1978*].
- The motion of FACs has been found to depend on the interplanetary magnetic field (IMF) and related to geomagnetic activities [e.g., *lijima and Potemra, 1978; Zanetti et al., 1983; Fujii et al. 1992; Anderson et al. 2002; Wang et al. 2006*].
- Although the majority of in situ FAC observations have been made from individual satellites, multi-spacecraft in situ observations have also been carried out to understand FACs [e.g., *Kelly et al., 1986; Chun and Russell , 1991; Marklund et al. 2007; Snekvik et al. 2007*].



ST-5 Mission and Orbit Profile

- Launch: Pegasus out of Vandenberg on March 22, 2006
- Mission Duration: March 22 June 21
- Orbit: Sun-Synchronized Dawn-dusk Meridian Plane
- Inclination: 105.6°
- Orbit Perigee/Apogee: 300/4500 km
- Orbit Period: 136 minute
- Constellation Configuration: String-of-Pearls
- Spacecraft Spacing: ~50 4000 km
- Spacecraft Separation: ~10 s ~10 min
- Communications: Deep Space Network McMurdo Ground Station

Multi-spacecraft ST-5 in situ FAC observations with large ranges of spatial and temporal separations at low-Earth orbit (LEO) provide an unprecedented opportunity to advance our understanding of FAC structure and dynamics [*Slavin et al., 2008*].

In this study, we use the magnetic field observations during the whole ST-5 mission to study FAC sheet motion and its dependence on solar wind and geomagnetic conditions.



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Local Geomagnetic Coordinates (LGM)

Local Geomagnetic Coordinates (LGM) using IGRF-10

 \mathbf{Z}_{IGM} is along the local magnetic field direction;

 Y_{LGM} is the cross product of Z_{LGM} and the geomagnetic

X_{LGM} completes the right-handed orthogonal

- FACs are assumed to have sheet-like structure along
- The maximum magnetic field variations caused by FAC should be along the X_{LGM} direction.

Calculation of FAC Speed, Thickness, and Current Density



FAC Thickness:

$$L = |V_y^{SC} - V_y^{FAC}|\Delta t$$

- Spin-averaged magnetic field observations of 1-s resolution are used.
- Residual magnetic field in the X_{LGM} direction is used.
- Best cross-correlation technique is used for spatial and temporal separations for each chosen pair for FAC speed calculation.

Most other studies with single S/C:

$$V_y^{FAC} = 0$$

This study:

FAC Criteria



- 1)The angle between the FAC maximum field variation direction, corresponding to the maximum MVA eigenvalue, and the LGM x axis is less than 30° (72% of the initial FACs).
- 2)The ratio between the medium and the maximum MVA eigenvalues is less than 0.3 (93% of the initial FACs) to make sure that the variation along the maximum variance direction is much more significant than that in the other directions.
- 3)The maximum Euler angle between the central and the two boundary LGM transformation matrices is less than 10° (81% of the initial FACs) to make sure that the constant LGM transformation matrix from the center of an FAC is valid throughout the entire FAC interval.
- 4)The maximum cross-correlation coefficient between each chosen spacecraft pair is larger than 0.9 (94% of the initial FACs) to restrict our FAC database to the FACs without much change between the chosen ST-5 pairs.
- 5)The attack angle of each FAC, the angle between the current sheet normal direction and spacecraft orbit track, is less than 60° (82% of the initial FACs) to avoid spacecraft skimming along current sheet which makes the determination of FAC speed and current density unreliable.
- 6)Speed error is less than 0.1 km/s (87% of the initial FACs) to ensure the accuracy of FAC speed calculations.

Solar wind and geomagnetic conditions

- The solar wind conditions from OMNI database with 1-minute resolution [*King and Papitashvili, 2005*] and geomagnetic Dst and Kp indices during the whole ST-5 mission.
- We add an extra 15-minute delay for FAC corresponding solar wind conditions to account for the response at the ionosphere to the development of the FACs from the magnetosphere [*Stauning et al., 1994; Vennerstrøm et al., 2002; Wang et al., 2006*].
- Generally mild conditions in wide ranges with several moderate magnetic storms.



FAC ionospheric footprint speed distribution

In order to avoid orbital bias, we map down each ST-5 FAC speed along IGRF-10 magnetic field line assuming that FAC current sheet sideway motion can be approximated as the entire current sheet structure mapped to new field lines [*Kelly et al., 1986; Chun and Russell, 1991*]:

(Here θ is the angle between Earth radial direction and magnetic field)

- There is a normal distribution for FAC speed between -1 and 1 km/s with the majority smaller than 0.5 km/s.
- Larger FAC speeds are more likely to be seen during higher geomagnetic activities (Kp>4) than during lower geomagnetic activities (Kp<4).
- During high geomagnetic activities, still a significant number of low FAC speeds are observed.



The V_{FAC}/V_{SC} at different altitudes

- The ratio between FAC speed and S/C speed is closely related to the accuracy of FAC thickness and current density calculations if stationary FAC is assumed.
- Mapping FAC speed along field line makes it possible to study the effects of FAC speed at different altitudes.
- Except at ST-5, circular spacecraft orbit perpendicular to the current sheet is assumed for the mapped cases, which is a reasonable assumption for the noon-midnight meridian plane where ST-5 orbit resides.

FAC ionospheric footprint speed dependence on IMF

- The median values are shown as thick horizontal bars, and errors are the corresponding standard deviations from the medians.
- There is a little |V_i| jump at Bz=~-3 nT.
- |V_i| increases between
 ~0.5 and ~3.5 nT with |B|
 before it flattens out for
 higher |B|.
- We see no other clear dependence of FAC ionospheric footprint speed on IMF.



FAC ionospheric footprint speed dependence on IMF angles

We see no clear dependence.



FAC ionospheric footprint speed dependence on solar wind conditions

We see no clear dependence.



FAC J_{peak} dependence on IMF

- We see general increase of J_{peak} with increasing |Bx|, |By|, and |B|.
- There is clearly more significant increase of J_{peak} with decreasing Bz when it is negative. And J_{peak} increases moderately with IMF Bz when it is positive.



FAC J_{peak} dependence on IMF angles

- We see clear J_{peak} bump between 90° and 270° IMF clock angle (Sbz). J_{peak} is flat beyond this range (NBz).
- There is clear J_{peak} bump for negative IMF tilt angle (SBz). J_{peak} is flat when the tilt angle is positive (NBz).
- We see no clear dependence of J_{peak} on IMF spiral and cone angles.



FAC J_{peak} dependence on solar wind conditions

- We see clearly enhanced J_{peak} with increasing solar wind dynamic pressure.
- J_{peak} is more or less flat when E_y is negative, and it increases with E_y when E_y is positive.
- We see no clear dependence of J_{peak} on solar wind Beta and M_A.



FAC speed and peak current density during magnetic storm

- The right panels show the FAC ionospheric footprint speed and ST-5 peak current density during 12-20 April 2006 geomagnetic storm.
- During the storm initial phase, we see clear FAC poleward motion.
- During the storm main phase, we see strong FAC equatorward motion.
- During the storm recovery phase, we see FAC motion in both directions.
- There is significantly enhanced peak current density during the storm initial and main phases, as well as the earlier part of the recovery phase.



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Summary and Conclusions

- We surveyed FAC observations from the whole ST-5 mission and found 2535 FAC signatures. 1030 are used with qualifying speed calculations after six filtering criteria to ensure the quality of the statistics.
- FACs are found to move generally faster during high geomagnetic activities than low geomagnetic activities with non-negligible exceptions.
- FAC speed can become more comparable to spacecraft speed across the current sheet with increasing altitude. As a result, the errors for FAC thickness and current density calculations can be significant if stationary FACs are assumed at mid- and high-altitudes.
- We find no dependence of FAC speed on IMF and solar wind conditions.
 We get much stronger dependence of FAC peak current density on some IMF and solar wind conditions.
- A case study of FAC speed and peak current density during a moderate geomagnetic storm shows unique pattern of FAC motion: First poleward motion, then equatorward motion, and finally motion in both directions.
