Fokker-Planck eq: what it means

 $f_{\sigma}(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) = \text{phase space density of species } \sigma (= e, p)$ **averaged** over ensemble of particle configurations

$$\mathbf{F}(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) = q_{\sigma} \mathbf{E}(\mathbf{x}) + q_{\sigma} \frac{\mathbf{v}}{c} \times \mathbf{B}(\mathbf{x})$$
Force felt by each particle in
ensemble @ (**x**, **v**)
ensemble-
averaged $\nabla \times \mathbf{B} = \frac{4\pi}{c} \mathbf{J}(\mathbf{x}) = \frac{4\pi e}{c} \int \left[\mathbf{v} f_p(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) - \mathbf{v} f_e(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) \right] d^3 \mathbf{v}$
fields
$$\mathbf{v} = \frac{4\pi e}{c} \int \left[\mathbf{v} f_p(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) - \mathbf{v} f_e(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) \right] d^3 \mathbf{v}$$
& similarly for $\mathbf{E}(\mathbf{x})$

$$\frac{\partial f_{\sigma}}{\partial t} = -\frac{\partial}{\partial x_{i}} \left(v_{i} f_{\sigma} \right) - \frac{\partial}{\partial v_{i}} \left[\frac{F_{i}(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v})}{m} f_{\sigma} \right] - \frac{\partial}{\partial v_{i}} \left(\left\langle \frac{\Delta v_{i}}{\Delta t} \right\rangle f_{\sigma} \right) + \frac{1}{2} \frac{\partial^{2}}{\partial v_{i} \partial v_{j}} \left(\left\langle \frac{\Delta v_{i} \Delta v_{j}}{\Delta t} \right\rangle f_{\sigma} \right)$$
Mean effects from fluctuating forces – averaged over ensemble

One use for F-P eqn. linear plasma waves

1. Start w/ static, uniform solution to F-P:

e.g. Maxwellians

$$f_{\sigma}^{(0)}(\mathbf{V}) \qquad \mathbf{E}^{(0)} = \mathbf{0} \qquad \mathbf{B}^{(0)} = B_0 \hat{\mathbf{z}}$$

2. Add small, plane-wave perturbation

$$f_{\sigma}(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}, t) = f_{\sigma}^{(0)}(\mathbf{v}) + \hat{f}_{\sigma}^{(1)}(\mathbf{v})e^{i\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{x}-i\omega t}$$
$$\mathbf{E}(\mathbf{x}, t) = \hat{\mathbf{E}}^{(1)}e^{i\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{x}-i\omega t} \quad \text{etc.}$$

3. Expand F-P to linear order in perturbation

$$-i\omega \hat{f}_{\sigma}^{(1)} = -i(\mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v}) \hat{f}_{\sigma}^{(1)} - \frac{q_{\sigma}}{m_{\sigma}c} (\mathbf{v} \times B_{0} \hat{\mathbf{z}}) \cdot \frac{\partial \hat{f}_{\sigma}^{(1)}}{\partial \mathbf{v}} - \frac{q_{\sigma}}{m_{\sigma}} \frac{\partial f_{\sigma}^{(0)}}{\partial \mathbf{v}} \cdot \left(\hat{\mathbf{E}}^{(1)} + \frac{\mathbf{v}}{c} \times \hat{\mathbf{B}}^{(1)}\right) - \cdots$$
$$\hat{\mathbf{B}}^{(1)} = i \frac{4\pi e}{ck^{2}} \mathbf{k} \times \int \left[\mathbf{v} \, \hat{f}_{p}^{(1)}(\mathbf{v}) - \mathbf{v} \, \hat{f}_{e}^{(1)}(\mathbf{v}) \right] d^{3} \mathbf{v} \qquad \& \text{ similarly for } \hat{\mathbf{E}}^{(1)}$$

linear integro-differential equation

- 4. Solve linearized eqn. for particular k Find many solutions:
- eigenfunctions...
- $\hat{f}_{e}^{(1)}(\mathbf{v}) \ \hat{f}_{p}^{(1)}(\mathbf{v})$

... eigenvectors ... $\hat{\mathbf{E}}^{(1)}$ $\hat{\mathbf{B}}^{(1)}$ (transverse, longitudinal, ...)

- ... and eigenfrequencies $\omega(\mathbf{k})$ wave modes
- e-freqs complex $Im(\omega) < 0$: damped $Im(\omega) > 0$: unstable
- all dependant on choice of equilibrium

$$f_{\sigma}^{(0)}(\mathbf{v})$$
$$\mathbf{B}^{(0)} = B_0 \hat{\mathbf{z}}$$



For many solutions (waves): $|\omega(\mathbf{k})| > \tau_{col}^{-1} = A(v)/v$ \rightarrow can neglect collisions i.e. discard $A_i(\mathbf{v}) \& D_{ii}(\mathbf{v})$ solve collisionless F-P eqn. *a.k.a.* Vlasov Eqn.

- initial solution, $f_{\sigma}^{(0)}(\mathbf{v})$, need not be Maxwellian many distributions work
- still find damping i.e. Landau damping
- sometimes find instabilities
 - \rightarrow growing waves



New meaning for Fokker-Planck

 \exists many random linear waves = small random E(x,t) & B(x,t) $f_{\sigma}(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) = \text{phase space density of species } \sigma (= e, p)$ averaged over ensemble of particle configurations **AND** ensemble of random waves

ensemble-averaged fields $\nabla \times \mathbf{B} = \frac{4\pi}{c} \mathbf{J}(\mathbf{x}) = \frac{4\pi e}{c} \int \left[\mathbf{v} f_p(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) - \mathbf{v} f_e(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v}) \right] d^3 \mathbf{v}$

WILL NOT include the waves & similarly for E(x)

$$\frac{\partial f_{\sigma}}{\partial t} = -\frac{\partial}{\partial x_i} \left(v_i f_{\sigma} \right) - \frac{\partial}{\partial v_i} \left[\frac{F_i(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v})}{m} f_{\sigma} \right] - \frac{\partial}{\partial v_i} \left(\left\langle \frac{\Delta v_i}{\Delta t} \right\rangle f_{\sigma} \right) + \frac{1}{2} \frac{\partial^2}{\partial v_i \partial v_j} \left(\left\langle \frac{\Delta v_i \Delta v_j}{\Delta t} \right\rangle f_{\sigma} \right)$$
Mean effects from fluctuating forces – averaged over particle ensemble AND wave ensemble

New meaning for Fokker-Planck

$$\frac{\partial f_{\sigma}}{\partial t} = -\frac{\partial}{\partial x_{i}} (\mathbf{v}_{i} f_{\sigma}) - \frac{\partial}{\partial \mathbf{v}_{i}} \left[\frac{F_{i}(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v})}{m} f_{\sigma} \right] - \frac{\partial}{\partial \mathbf{v}_{i}} \left(\left\langle \frac{\Delta \mathbf{v}_{i}}{\Delta t} \right\rangle f_{\sigma} \right) + \frac{1}{2} \frac{\partial^{2}}{\partial \mathbf{v}_{i} \partial \mathbf{v}_{j}} \left(\frac{\Delta \mathbf{v}_{i} \Delta \mathbf{v}_{j}}{\Delta t} \right) f_{\sigma} \right)$$
diffusion includes 2 components $\frac{1}{2} \left\langle \frac{\Delta \mathbf{v}_{i} \Delta \mathbf{v}_{j}}{\Delta t} \right\rangle = D_{ij} = D_{ij} = D_{ij}^{(\text{col})} + D_{ij}^{(\text{turb})}$
effect of random interaction between discrete particles – collisions (as before)
effect of random forces from turbulence of plasma waves
new element $D_{ij}^{(\text{turb})}(\mathbf{v}) \sim \frac{\pi}{2} \frac{e^{2}}{m^{2}} \int d^{3}k \, d\omega \, \overline{W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega)} \, \delta(\omega - \mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v})$

New meaning for Fokker-Planck

$$\frac{\partial f_{\sigma}}{\partial t} = -\frac{\partial}{\partial x_{i}} \left(\mathbf{v}_{i} f_{\sigma} \right) - \frac{\partial}{\partial \mathbf{v}_{i}} \left[\frac{F_{i}(\mathbf{x}, \mathbf{v})}{m} f_{\sigma} \right] - \frac{\partial}{\partial \mathbf{v}_{i}} \left(\left\langle \frac{\Delta \mathbf{v}_{i}}{\Delta t} \right\rangle f_{\sigma} \right) + \frac{1}{2} \frac{\partial^{2}}{\partial \mathbf{v}_{i} \partial \mathbf{v}_{j}} \left(\left(\frac{\Delta \mathbf{v}_{i} \Delta \mathbf{v}_{j}}{\Delta t} \right) f_{\sigma} \right) \right)$$

diffusion includes 2 components

$$\frac{1}{2} \left\langle \frac{\Delta \mathbf{v}_i \Delta \mathbf{v}_j}{\Delta t} \right\rangle = D_{ij} = D_{ij}^{(\text{col})} + D_{ij}^{(\text{turb})}$$

Energy $\varepsilon_{\sigma} = \frac{1}{2}m_{\sigma}\int v^{2}f_{\sigma}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{v})d^{3}v$ Saw in last lecture that $D_{ij}^{(col)}$ from elastic collisions will conserve particle energy.

Q: Do we expect $D_{ij}^{(turb)}$ to conserve particle energy as well? Decrease it? Increase it?

Illustration of turbulent effect

Simplest case: unmagnetized plasma $\mathbf{B}^{(0)} = \mathbf{0}$ (but not most relevant)

largest force from random electric field

$$\mathbf{E}_{i}(\mathbf{x},t) = \int \hat{E}_{i}(\mathbf{k},\omega) e^{i(\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{x}-\omega t)} d^{3}k \, d\omega$$

random Fourier coefficients

Ensemble of random fields:

• Fourier coefficients $\hat{E}_i(\mathbf{k},\omega)$ are random complex variables

• Zero mean
$$\langle \hat{E}_i(\mathbf{k},\omega) \rangle = 0$$

• Variance specified by spectrum W_{ii}(**k**,w)

$$\begin{split} \mathbf{E}_{i}(\mathbf{x},t) &= \int \hat{E}_{i}(\mathbf{k},\omega) e^{i(\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{x}-\omega t)} d^{3}k \, d\omega \\ \left\langle E_{i}(\mathbf{x},t) E_{j}(\mathbf{x},t) \right\rangle &= \int d^{3}k \, d\omega \int d^{3}k' \, d\omega' e^{i(\mathbf{k}+\mathbf{k}')\cdot\mathbf{x}-i(\omega+\omega')t} \left\langle E_{i}(\mathbf{k},\omega) E_{j}(\mathbf{k}',\omega') \right\rangle \end{split}$$

Stationary homogeneous turbulence \rightarrow correlation only between $\hat{E}_i(\mathbf{k},\omega)$ and $\hat{E}_j(-\mathbf{k},-\omega)$

$$\left\langle \hat{E}_{i}(\mathbf{k},\omega)\hat{E}_{j}(\mathbf{k}',\omega')\right\rangle = \underbrace{W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega)}_{ij}\delta(\mathbf{k}+\mathbf{k}')\delta(\omega+\omega') \\ \text{spectral homo-stationary} \\ \text{density geneous} \\ \text{avgs. indep.} \\ \text{of } \mathbf{x} \text{ or t} \quad \left\langle E_{i}(\mathbf{x},t)E_{j}(\mathbf{x},t)\right\rangle = \int d^{3}k \,d\omega \,W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega) = \left\langle E_{i}E_{j}\right\rangle$$

energy density in turbulent waves: $\varepsilon_{\text{turb}} = \frac{1}{8\pi} \langle E_i E_i \rangle = \frac{1}{8\pi} \int d^3k \, d\omega \, W_{ii}(\mathbf{k}, \omega)$

velocity change
due to waves
$$\Delta \mathbf{v}_i = \int_0^{\Delta t} \dot{\mathbf{v}}_i(t) dt = \int_0^{\Delta t} \frac{q}{m} \mathbf{E}_i dt = \frac{q}{m} \int_0^{\Delta t} \mathbf{E}_i(\mathbf{v}t,t) dt$$

motion of free particle (unaffected by waves)

using
$$E_i(\mathbf{v}t,t) = \int \hat{E}_i(\mathbf{k},\omega) e^{i(\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{v}-\omega)t} d^3k d\omega$$

$$\left\langle \Delta \mathbf{v}_{i} \Delta \mathbf{v}_{j} \right\rangle = \frac{q^{2}}{m^{2}} \int_{0}^{\Delta t} \mathrm{dt} \int_{0}^{\Delta t} \mathrm{dt}' \int d^{3}k \, d\omega \int d^{3}k' \, d\omega' e^{i(\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{v}-\omega)t} e^{i(\mathbf{k}'\cdot\mathbf{v}-\omega')t'} \left\langle \hat{\mathbf{E}}_{i}(\mathbf{k},\omega)\hat{\mathbf{E}}_{j}(\mathbf{k}',\omega') \right\rangle$$

and using $\left\langle \hat{E}_{i}(\mathbf{k},\omega)\hat{E}_{j}(\mathbf{k}',\omega') \right\rangle = W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega)\delta(\mathbf{k}+\mathbf{k}')\delta(\omega+\omega')$

yields
correlation
$$\langle \Delta v_i \Delta v_j \rangle = \frac{q^2}{m^2} \int d^3k \, d\omega \, W_{ij}(\mathbf{k}, \omega) \left[\int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt \int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt' \, e^{i(\mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v} - \omega)(t - t')} \right]$$

what is this?

assuming
$$\Delta t \gg \int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt' e^{i(\omega - \mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v})t'} \approx \int_{0}^{\infty} dt' e^{i(\omega - \mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v})t'} = \pi \,\delta(\omega - \mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v})$$

wave periods

$$\Rightarrow \int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt \int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt' e^{i(\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{v}-\omega)(t-t')} = \int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt \,\pi \,\delta(\omega - \mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{v}) = \Delta t \,\pi \,\delta(\omega - \mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{v})$$

$$\Rightarrow \left\langle \Delta \mathbf{v}_{i} \Delta \mathbf{v}_{j} \right\rangle = \frac{e^{2}}{m^{2}} \int d^{3}k \, d\omega \, W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega) \left[\int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt \int_{0}^{\Delta t} dt' \, e^{i(\mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{v}-\omega)(t-t')} \right] \\ = \Delta t \, \pi \frac{e^{2}}{m^{2}} \int d^{3}k \, d\omega \, W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega) \, \delta(\omega - \mathbf{k}\cdot\mathbf{v})$$

Doppler resonance: $\omega' = 0$

Fokker-Planck coefficient

$$D_{ij}^{(\text{turb})}(\mathbf{v}) = \frac{1}{2} \left\langle \frac{\Delta \mathbf{v}_i \Delta \mathbf{v}_j}{\Delta t} \right\rangle = \frac{\pi}{2} \frac{e^2}{m^2} \int d^3k \, d\omega \quad W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega) \quad \underbrace{\delta(\omega - \mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v})}_{\text{spectral in resonant density}} \quad \text{spectral in variable}$$

$$D_{ij}^{(\text{turb})}(\mathbf{v}) = \frac{\pi}{2} \frac{e^2}{m^2} \int d^3k \, d\omega \ W_{ij}(\mathbf{k},\omega) \ \delta(\omega - \mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v})$$

Can express diffusion in form

$$D_{ij}^{(\text{turb})}(\mathbf{v}) = 4\pi^2 \frac{e^2}{m^2} \varepsilon_{\text{turb}} \tau_{ij}(\mathbf{v})$$

\$\sim to energy density of turbulence

v dependence from resonance in spectral shape alone

$$\tau_{ij}(\mathbf{v}) = \frac{\int d^3k \ W_{ij}(\mathbf{k}, \mathbf{k} \cdot \mathbf{v})}{\int d^3k \ d\omega \ W_{nn}(\mathbf{k}, \omega)}$$

Collisional diffusion: from \checkmark particle-particle interactions – drives $f_{\sigma}(\mathbf{x},\mathbf{v})$ toward a Maxwellian (LTE)

Turbulent diffusion: from wave-particle interactions – drives $f_{\sigma}(x,v)$ toward ???

$$D_{ij}^{(\text{col})}(\mathbf{v}) \sim \frac{4\pi e^4 \Lambda n' {v'}_{rms}^2}{m^2} \frac{\delta_{ij}}{v^3}$$

$$D_{ij}^{(\text{turb})}(\mathbf{v}) = 4\pi^2 \frac{e^2}{m^2} \varepsilon_{\text{turb}} \tau_{ij}(\mathbf{v})$$

$$f(\mathbf{v}) \propto |\mathbf{v}|^{-\xi} \qquad \xi = \frac{e^2 n \Lambda \overline{k}}{\pi \varepsilon_{\text{turb}}}$$

- Produces power law tail in distribution function
- Energy source: turbulence of waves
- Acceleration via wave-particle interaction
- more vigorous turbulence → harder spectrum (i.e. smaller ξ)

Stochastic acceleration in action

Miller et al. (1996)

FMS waves – wave-particle interaction via moving mirrors

Diffusive Shock acceleration

Assumes wave turbulence^{*} producing little/no energy change [sic] but very effective pitch angle scattering

$$\begin{pmatrix} \frac{\partial \tilde{f}(v,\mu)}{\partial t} \end{pmatrix}_{col} = \frac{\partial}{\partial v} \begin{bmatrix} D^{(turb)} \frac{\partial \tilde{f}}{\partial v} \\ D^{(v)} \frac{\partial \tilde{f}}{\partial v} \end{bmatrix} + \frac{\partial}{\partial \mu} \begin{bmatrix} \frac{D^{(turb)}}{\partial \theta} (1-\mu^2) \frac{\partial \tilde{f}}{\partial \mu} \\ dominant term \\ \tau_{pa} \sim \frac{V^2}{D^{(turb)}_{\theta\theta}} \quad \text{is v. small} \Rightarrow \quad \frac{\partial \tilde{f}}{\partial \mu} \approx 0 \quad \begin{array}{c} \text{isotopic distribution} \\ \text{of velocity} \\ \end{array}$$

"little/no energy change" – yet still the waves can lead to particle acceleration – given a shock

* Alfven wave turbulence has this property

<u>Fact 1:</u> Strong pitch angle scattering leads to a random walk along field line **>** spatial diffusion

Random walk → spatial diffusion w/ coefficient

A: It is isotropic in reference frame of the **fluid** in which waves are propagating – frame moving at fluid velocity **u**

<u>Fact 2:</u> Strong pitch angle scattering leads to a change in energy where $\nabla \cdot \mathbf{u} \neq 0$

Consider a place where $\nabla \cdot \mathbf{u} > 0$ & define x as the gradient direction: $\nabla \cdot \mathbf{u} = \partial u_x / \partial x > 0$

A particle has velocity **v** which does not change as it moves up gradient of u_x . What happens to |v - u|?

Summary

- F-P eqn. can include effect of random plasma waves on particles – wave-particle interactions
- Effect captured in D_{ii}^(turb)
- Can lead to non-thermal tail incl. power law
- Wave-particle pitch-angle scattering + shock → diffusive shock acceleration
- Viable explanations for NT tail is it correct? How could we tell?

State of the field today

- SEP ion acceleration diffusive shock (general consensus IMHO)
- Flare acceleration (e⁻ or ion) no consensus IMHO
 - SA models popular
 - need to account for observations of $\delta(t)$, $E_c(t)$ etc.
 - SA models not coupled to global flare model no self-consistent energy supply (start w/ given turbulence)
