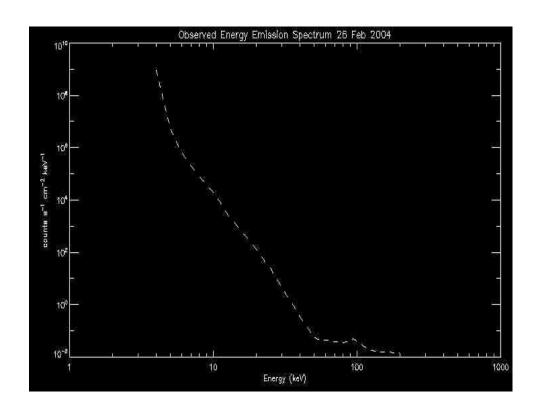

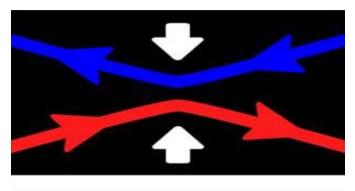
Context : Observations

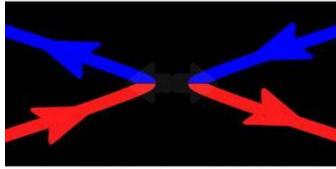


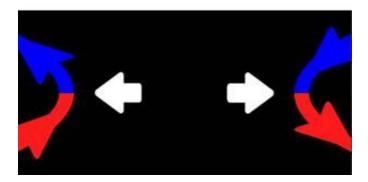
- X-class flare, 26 Feb 2004
- Unique traits:
 - Few non-thermal particles
 - Super-hot (T>30MK)
 - Hard x-ray emission
- What mechanisms govern total energy release?

In the absence of non-thermal particles, fluid-based magnetic reconnection

Magnetic Reconnection







- Change in magnetic topology to achieve lowerenergy state
- Retraction of field lines due to tension converts stored magnetic energy into kinetic energy, heat

The Model: Post Reconnection Evolution of a Flux Tube (PREFT)

- Initial conditions : bent flux tube in the postreconnection state
- Energy is released as the flux tube retracts to equilibrium length
- Slow magneto-sonic shocks compress and heat the plasma to a loop-top source of hard x-ray emission

Governing Equations (1D hydrodynamics)

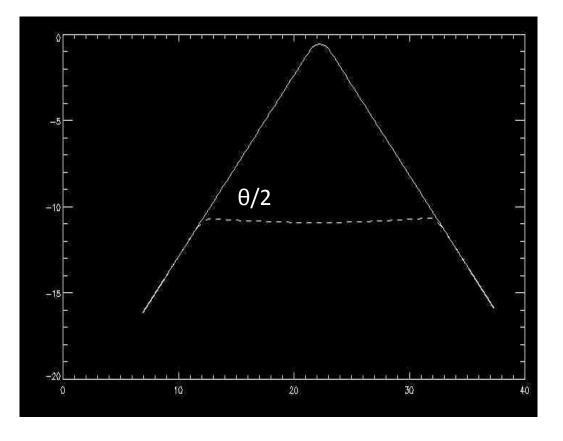
• Momentum Equation:

$$\rho \frac{d\boldsymbol{v}}{dt} = \left(\frac{B^2}{4\pi} - p\right) \frac{\partial \hat{\boldsymbol{b}}}{\partial l} + \frac{\partial}{\partial l} \left(\frac{4}{3}\mu \hat{\boldsymbol{b}} \cdot \frac{\partial \boldsymbol{v}}{\partial l} \hat{\boldsymbol{b}}\right) - \frac{\partial p}{\partial l} \hat{\boldsymbol{b}} + \rho \boldsymbol{g} \cdot \hat{\boldsymbol{b}}$$
magnetic viscosity other forces
Energy Equation: tension
$$c_V \rho \left(\frac{dT}{dt}\right) = -p(\hat{\boldsymbol{b}} \cdot \frac{\partial \boldsymbol{v}}{\partial l} - \boldsymbol{v} \cdot \nabla \ln(B)) + \frac{4}{3}\mu \left(\hat{\boldsymbol{b}} \cdot \frac{\partial \boldsymbol{v}}{\partial l}\right)^2 + \frac{\partial}{\partial l} \left(\frac{\partial T}{\partial l}\right)\kappa(T) - n_e^2 \Lambda(T) + H_{eq}$$

• (Assumptions: $\beta \ll 1 \rightarrow$ Magnetic pressure dominates. Gravity, relativity negligible; magnetic field constant)

Simulation Setup



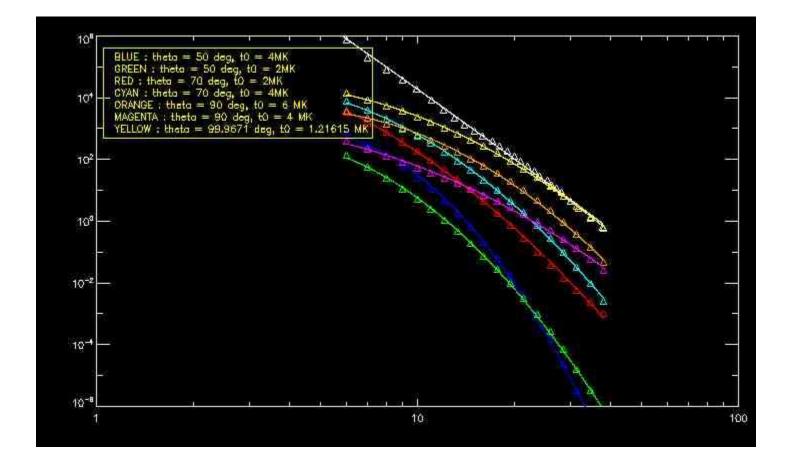
- Measured parameters
 - Global magnetic field
 - Final tube length
- Free parameters
 - Reconnection angle(θ)
 - Initial tube length
 - Initial loop-top temperature

Bonus: 3-dimensional physics with 1-dimensional hydrodynamics (because of frozen-in theorem)!

Simulation Specifics

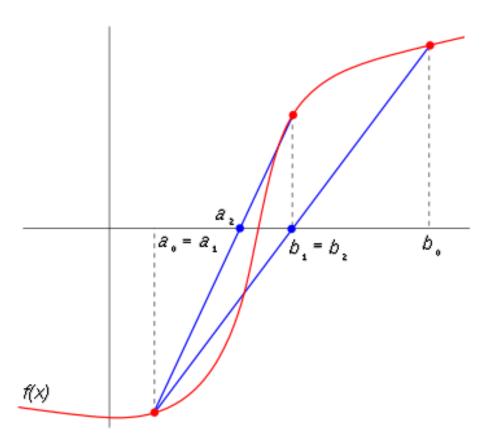
- Dynamic length and time scales
 - Possible to recover small- and large-scale dynamics
 - Much easier in 1D!
- Progress of the Simulation
 - Retraction
 - "Straightening"
 - Cooling

Challenges of 3D parameter space



Searching Parameter Space

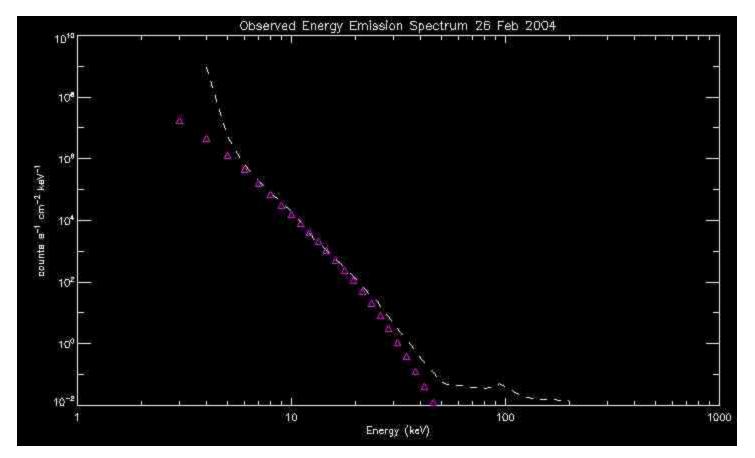
 Root-finding in 3 (parameter) dimensions via generalization of the *regula falsi* ("false position") method



Preliminary Results

- Initial length = 43.5 Mm
- Initial loop-top temperature = 4.5 MK
- Reconnection Angle = 92 degrees

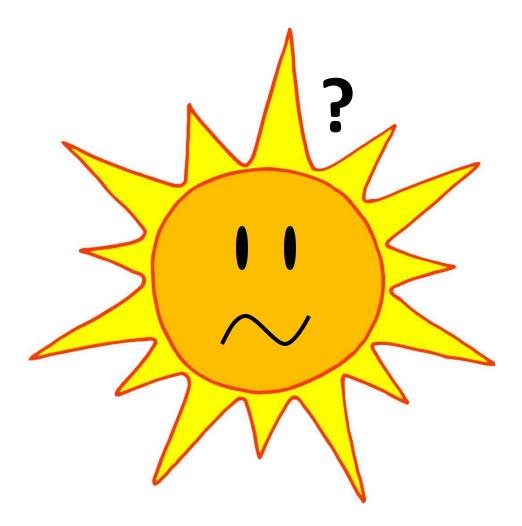
- Magnetic Field = 400 G
- Final Length = 35 Mm



Future Work

- **STEP 1**: Are there parameters that will allow a better fit at high and low energies?
- **STEP 2 :** Fitted to energy emission, how well does our simulation reproduce other observables from the flare?
- **STEP 0-∞**: What does this tell us about the physics of flares?
