The Ising Model

Spins have only two states, +1 (\uparrow) or -1 (\downarrow). Energy is given by

$$E = -J \sum_{(i,j)} S_i S_j$$

 $S_{i=}$ spin at site i of crystalline lattice

(i,j) = nearest neighbors in the lattice

J = interaction strength

$$\uparrow\uparrow$$
, $\downarrow\downarrow$ spins aligned $\Rightarrow E=-J$

$$\uparrow\downarrow$$
, $\downarrow\uparrow$ spins not aligned $\Rightarrow E=+J$

If J > 0, the state of lowest energy is when all spins are aligned. This is called a ferromagnet.

J < 0 is an antiferromagnet, which also occurs in real systems (will come back to this later).
