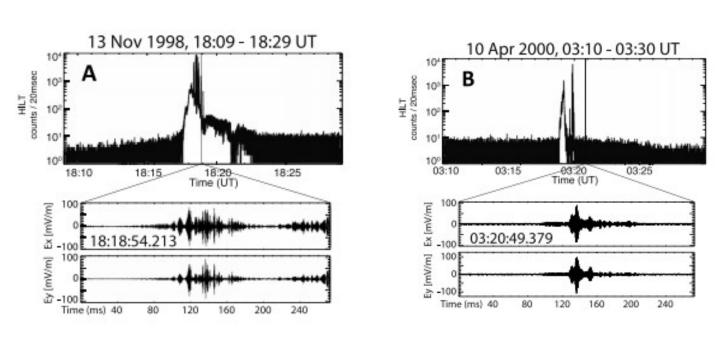
FIREBIRD Mission Background

- The FIREBIRD Mission consists of two satellites operating simultaneously to answer the following:
 - What is the spatial scale size of an individual microburst?
 - What is the energy dependence of an individual microburst?
 - How much total electron loss from the radiation belts do microbursts produce globally?
- Satellites launched into same orbit with slowly varying separation distance (~3-6 cm/s)
- 2 SSD Detectors with 6 energy levels ranging from 2.2 KeV-1.1MeV per satellite
 - One Detector is recessed into the satellite,
 the other is not



Electron Microbursts Background

- Bursty energetic particle precipitation to the ionosphere
 - Believed to be correlated with Whistler
 Mode Chorus Waves in Magnetosphere
 - FIREBIRD Data in conjunction with Van Allen Belt Probes will investigate this correlation

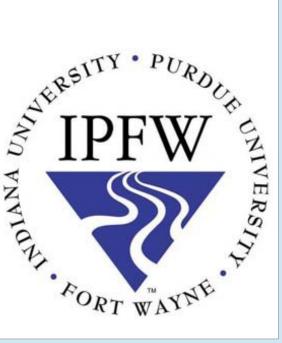


Solar Physics REU Goals

- Automatically report "interesting" regions in particle count-rate data
- Develop software for HAM radio operators that identifies FIREBIRD Beacon Data and forwards to SSEL at Montana State University

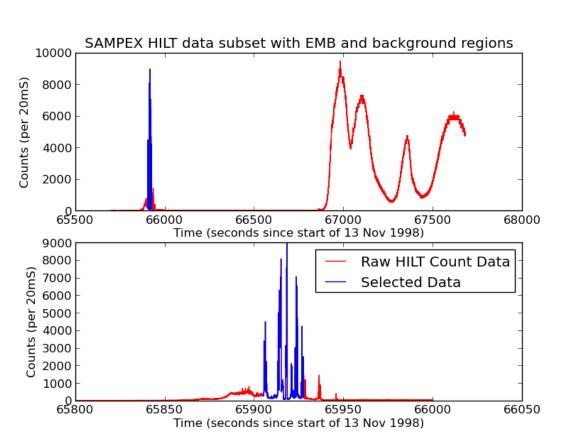




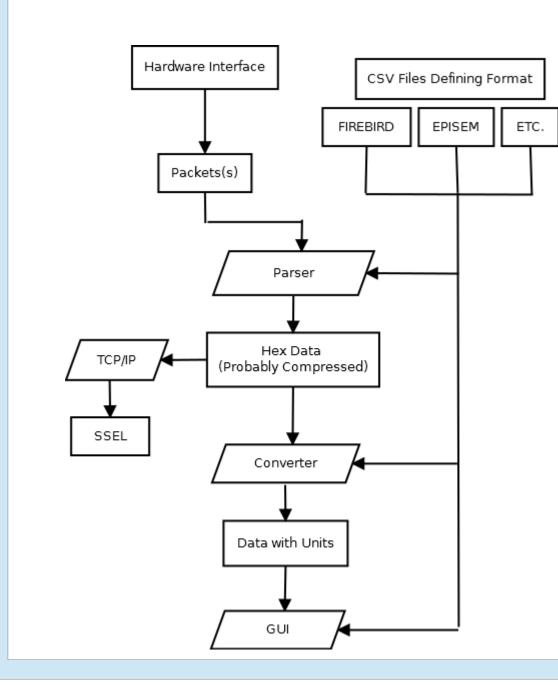


Current Progress

- Completed preliminary program for autodetection of microbursts in SAMPEX Data from HILT Detector



- Research into structure of beacon packets is ongoing
