# Space Weather Highlights 08 – 14 November 2004

### SWO PRF 1524 16 November 2004

Solar activity ranged from very low to high this period. Very low levels occurred on 12 – 13 November, low levels on 11 and 14 November, moderate levels on 08 November and high levels on 09 – 10 November. Region 693 (S16, L=076, class/area, Fkc/780 on 01 November) showed steady decay this period and accounted for only one low-level C-class flare. It quietly rotated around the west limb on the 9th. Region 696 (N09, L=026, class/area, Ekc/910 on 06 November) continued to be this period's largest and most active group. On 08 November, Region 696 produced an impulsive M2.3/1n flare at 08/1549 UTC. Levels returned to high on the 9th as the region produced an M8.9/2n Tenflare (1000 sfu) with Type II and IV sweeps at 09/1719 UTC. Accompanying this event was a very fast, asymmetric, full halo CME with a plane-ofsky speed of near 1800 km/s. A 23-degree fragmented filament erupted south of the region at the same time as the flare. On 10 November, Region 696 produced the largest event of the summary period, as well as the largest of its life-cycle, an X2.5/3b proton flare and Tenflare (650 sfu) at 10/0213 UTC with Type II and IV sweeps. Another very fast, asymmetrical, full halo CME accompanied this event. Plane-of-sky speed of this CME was estimated at near 2000 km/s. By 11 November, Region 696 had decayed considerably as it approached the west limb, but maintained a weak delta configuration. The region rotated quietly around the west limb on the 12<sup>th</sup>. Other activity included low-level C-class flaring on 08 – 09 November from Region 698 (S09, L=062, class/area, Dao/160 on 09 November). New Region 700 (N04, L=312, class/area, Dri/080 on 14 November) formed on the disk on the 11<sup>th</sup> and underwent slight growth in magnetic structure on 13 – 14 November, but produced only low-level C-class activity.

NOTE: Due to the quantity of CME activity on 07 November, and the relationship to subsequent geomagnetic activity on 08 - 10 November, the Space Weather Highlights period is from 07 - 14 November which includes a reassessment of activity on the  $7^{th}$ .

Solar wind data were available from the NASA Advanced Composition Explorer (ACE) spacecraft during most of the summary period. Solar wind speed ranged from a low of near 425 km/s late on 14 November to a high near 825 km/s early on 10 November. Early on 07 November, the first of six shocks arrived at Earth. At approximately 07/0200 UTC, wind speed jumped slightly from 310 to 360 km/s and density and temperature both increased with a corresponding southward turning of the IMF Bz. A weak sudden impulse of 7 nT was recorded at Boulder at 07/0258 UTC. This shock was most likely from the M5/asymmetric halo CME of 03/1606 UTC. At approximately 07/1000 UTC, wind speed increased from 350 to 420 km/s along with an increase in density and temperature. A sudden impulse of 35 nT was observed at Boulder at 07/1113 UTC. This shock was most likely from the long duration C6.3 partial halo CME of 04/0954 UTC. Later in the day on 07 November, a shock was observed at 1755 UTC. The shock increased wind speed from near 500 to near 700 km/s with a corresponding increase in density and temperature. A sudden impulse of 41 nT was recorded at Boulder at 07/1831 UTC. The source of this shock most likely was from a combination of the complex series of CME's late on 04 November (M2.5 at 2229 UTC and M5.4 at 2309 UTC) and early on 06 November (M9.3 at 0034 UTC). At 09/0913 UTC, a weak shock was recorded at ACE that indicated a good jump in speed (600 to near 800 km/s), but not much change in Bt or Bz. This might have been from the M3.6 on 06/0157 UTC and got delayed behind the M9.3 on 06/0034 UTC. Later on the 9th, at 1818 UTC, ACE recorded another shock with a wind speed increase from near 675 km/s to near 825 km/s, and a southward turning of Bz to -30 nT. A sudden impulse of 46 nT was observed at Boulder at 1852 UTC. GOES 10 and 12 spacecraft observed magnetopause crossings following the sudden impulse. This activity was believed to be from the X2.0 flare on the 7th. Finally, at 11/1714 UTC, a weak sudden impulse of 12 nT was observed at Boulder. Solar wind plasma and magnetic field measurements at ACE indicated weak transient flow, likely from the CME activity on 09 November. By early on the 12<sup>th</sup>, wind parameters relaxed and ended the summary period weak with the IMF Bz trended north about +5 nT.

A greater than 10 MeV proton event began at 07/1910 UTC, reached a maximum value of 495 pfu at 08/0115 UTC, and ended at 13/1600 UTC. An enhancement of the greater than 100 MeV protons was observed on 07 – 08 November. This event was associated with the X2.0 flare on 07 November. Early on 10 November, a new influx of high energy protons followed the X2.5 flare at 10/0213 UTC. A secondary peak of 424 pfu on the greater than 10 MeV trace was recorded at 10/1655 UTC. A greater than 100 MeV proton event also occurred in association with the X2.5 flare. It began on 10/0320 UTC, peaked at 2.1 pfu at 10/0340 UTC, and ended at 10/1250 UTC.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit was at high levels for the entire summary period.



The geomagnetic field, through midday on 07 November, was at quiet to unsettled levels. By 1830 UTC on 07 November, activity levels increased to minor to severe storm levels as CME activity from the major flares arrived at Earth. A short lull in geomagnetic activity late on 08 November was followed by another significant and prolonged period of CME induced minor to severe geomagnetic storming. Major to severe storming was observed between 09/1200 UTC through 10/1800 UTC. By 10/2100 UTC, activity decreased to mostly active to minor storm levels as CME activity abated. By 13 November, activity levels were predominately quiet with isolated active periods midday on the 13<sup>th</sup> and again early on the 14<sup>th</sup> as brief periods of southward Bz, coupled with elevated solar wind speed, were observed.

### Space Weather Outlook 17 November – 13 December 2004

Solar activity is expected to be at mostly low to isolated moderate levels through 18 November due to the complex magnetic structure of Region 700. Thereafter, activity levels are expected to increase to low to moderate when old Region 691 (18 November) and Region 696 (26 November) returns.

A greater than 10 MeV proton event is possible after 26 November with major flare activity from old Region 696.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be at high levels on 17 - 18 November and again on 06 - 11 Dec.

The geomagnetic field is expected to range from mostly quiet to unsettled. From 06 - 10 December, a recurrent coronal hole wind stream is expected to become geoeffective.

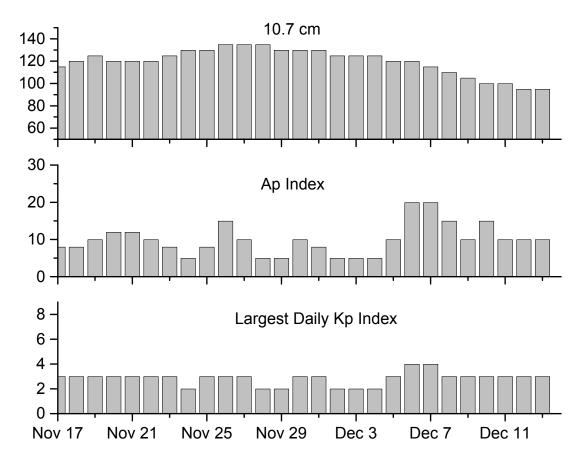

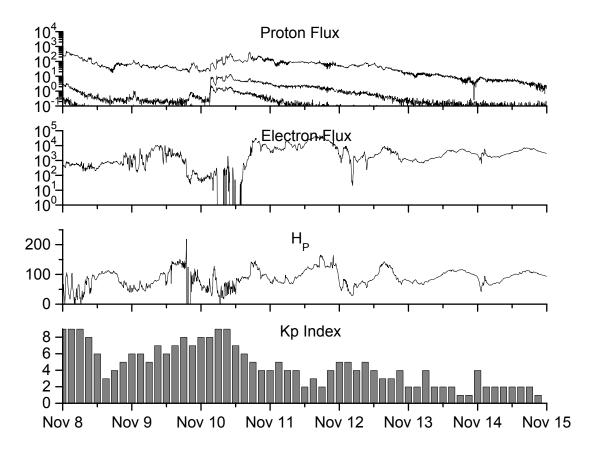

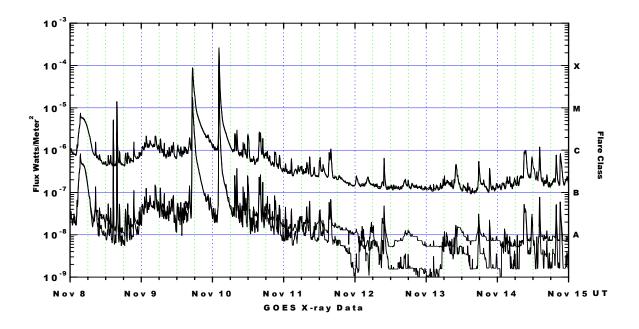
*Electrons* plot contains the five-minute averaged integral electron flux (electrons/cm<sup>2</sup> –sec –sr) with energies greater than 2 MeV at GOES-12 (W75).

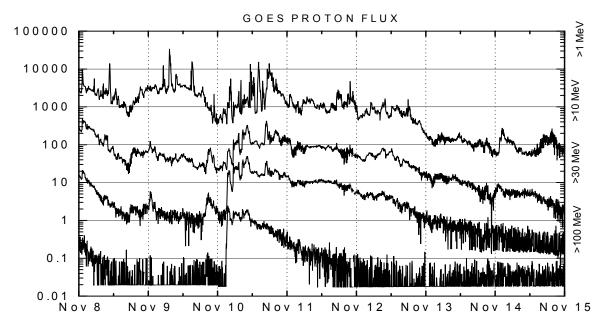
*Hp* plot contains the five minute averaged magnetic field H - component in nanoteslas (nT) as measured by GOES-12. The H component is parallel to the spin axis of the satellite, which is nearly parallel to the Earth's rotation axis.

*Kp* plot contains the estimated planetary 3-hour K-index (derived by the Air Force Weather Agency) in real time from magnetometers at Meanook, Canada; Sitka, AK; Glenlea, Canada; St. Johns, Canada; Ottawa, Canada; Newport, WA; Fredericksburg, VA; Boulder, CO; Fresno, CA and Hartland, UK. These data are made available through cooperation from the Geological Survey of Canada (GSC), British Geological Survey (BGS) and the US Geological Survey. These may differ from the final Kp values derived from a more extensive network of magnetometers.

The data included here are those now available in real time at the SWO and are incomplete in that they do not include the full set of parameters and energy ranges known to cause satellite operating anomalies. The proton and electron fluxes and Kp are "global" parameters that are applicable to a first order approximation over large areas. Haparallel is subject to more localized phenomena and the measurements generally are applicable to within a few degrees of longitude of the measuring satellite.







Weekly GOES Satellite X-ray and Proton Plots

*X-ray* plot contains five-minute averaged x-ray flux (watts/m<sup>2)</sup> as measured by GOES 12 (W75) and GOES 10 (W135) in two wavelength bands, .05 - . 4 and .1 - .8 nm. The letters A, B, C, M and X refer to x-ray event levels for the .1 - .8 nm band.

Proton plot contains the five-minute averaged integral proton flux (protons/cm<sup>2</sup> –sec-sr) as measured by GOES-11 (W103) for each of the energy thresholds: >1, >10, >30 and >100 MeV. P10 event threshold is 10 pfu (protons/cm<sup>2</sup>-sec-sr) at greater than 10 MeV.
