Space Weather Highlights 14 - 20 March 2005

SWO PRF 1542 22 March 2005

Solar activity ranged from very low to low. On 14 and 15 March, solar activity reached low levels with a C1 flare at 14/0708 UTC and a C2 flare at 15/0647 UTC. Both of these flares were produced from Region 741 (N10, L=200, class/area, Dso/100 on 15 March). Region 741 rotated around the West limb on 16 March. On 15 and 16 March, conditions were very low. Activity increased again on 17 through 20 March to low levels. Region 743 (S08, L=124, class/area, Dki/390 on 19 March) produced four low-level C-class events during these three days. A C2.3 flare occurred from region 743 at 19/0707 UTC with a Type II radio sweep (estimated shock velocity 413 km/s); however, the associated CME was not expected to be geoeffective. The largest flare of the period was a C4.1 produced from Region 742 (S06, L=156, class/area, Eao/350 on 16 March) at 20/0159 UTC.

Solar wind data were available from the NASA Advanced Composition Explorer (ACE) spacecraft during most of the summary period. The period began with solar wind speed near 360 km/s. Solar wind speed began to rise on the 14th to around 400 km/s. Plasma density and IMF total magnetic field rose following a solar sector boundary (SSB) crossing and a weak coronal hole high speed stream (HSS). A gradual decline in solar wind measurements began on 15 March and continued until approximately midday on the 16th when another SSB crossing occurred. Solar wind speed began increasing to a maximum of approximately 490 km/s on the 19th. About midday on 18 March, Bz was fluctuating between +/- 10 nT, but the range soon decreased to +/- 5 nT by 19 March. After 18 March, solar wind speed began decreasing and ended the period near 330 km/s.

No greater than 10 MeV proton events were observed this period.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit was below event threshold the entire reporting period.

The geomagnetic field ranged from quiet to minor storm levels at lower latitudes with minor to major storm periods at the higher latitudes. The period began on 14 March with quiet to minor storm levels at lower latitudes and minor to major storm periods at high latitudes. Heightened activity was due to a SSB crossing followed by a weak HSS. On 15 March, conditions were quiet. On 16, 18, and 20 March, conditions were quiet to unsettled. On 17 March, conditions were quiet to active with an isolated minor storm period at high latitudes due to the presence of another weak geoeffective HSS. Conditions were quiet to active, with an isolated minor storm period on 19 March due to the continued presence of the weak HSS and periods of prolonged southward Bz early in the UTC day.

Space Weather Outlook 23 March - 18 April 2005

Solar activity is expected be at very low to low levels. A region on the far side of the sun produced a CME at 21/1448 UTC. This region may increase activity levels when it rotates into view on approximately 24 - 25 March.

A greater than 10 MeV proton event is not expected.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be at high levels on 27 - 30 March, and 03 - 08 April.

The geomagnetic field is expected to range from quiet to minor storm levels. Coronal hole high speed wind streams are expected to produce unsettled to active levels with occasional minor storm periods on 26-29 March, 02-06 April, and again on 10 April. Quiet to active conditions are expected on 12-13 April due to a weak HSS. Otherwise, expect quiet to unsettled conditions.





Weekly Geosynchronous Satellite Environment Summary Week Beginning 14 March 2005

Protons plot contains the five-minute averaged integral proton flux (protons/cm²-sec -sr) as measured by GOES-11 (W110) for each of three energy thresholds: greater than 10, 50, and 100 MeV.


Electrons plot contains the five-minute averaged integral electron flux (electrons/cm² –sec –sr) with energies greater than 2 MeV at GOES-12 (W75).


Hp plot contains the five minute averaged magnetic field H - component in nanoteslas (nT) as measured by GOES-12. The H component is parallel to the spin axis of the satellite, which is nearly parallel to the Earth's rotation axis.

Kp plot contains the estimated planetary 3-hour K-index (derived by the Air Force Weather Agency) in real time from magnetometers at Meanook, Canada; Sitka, AK; Glenlea, Canada; St. Johns, Canada; Ottawa, Canada; Newport, WA; Fredericksburg, VA; Boulder, CO; Fresno, CA and Hartland, UK. These data are made available through cooperation from the Geological Survey of Canada (GSC), British Geological Survey (BGS) and the US Geological Survey. These may differ from the final Kp values derived from a more extensive network of magnetometers.

The data included here are those now available in real time at the SWO and are incomplete in that they do not include the full set of parameters and energy ranges known to cause satellite operating anomalies. The proton and electron fluxes and Kp are "global" parameters that are applicable to a first order approximation over large areas. H parallel is subject to more localized phenomena and the measurements generally are applicable to within a few degrees of longitude of the measuring satellite.







Weekly GOES Satellite X-ray and Proton Plots

X-ray plot contains five-minute averaged x-ray flux (watts/m²⁾ as measured by GOES 12 (W76) and GOES 10 (W135) in two wavelength bands, .05 - . 4 and .1 - .8 nm. The letters A, B, C, M and X refer to x-ray event levels for the .1 - .8 nm band.

Proton plot contains the five-minute averaged integral proton flux (protons/cm² –sec-sr) as measured by GOES-11 (W110) for each of the energy thresholds: >1, >10, >30 and >100 MeV. P10 event threshold is 10 pfu (protons/cm²-sec-sr) at greater than 10 MeV.
