Space Weather Highlights 28 March – 03 April 2005

SWO PRF 1544 05 April 2005

Solar activity was very low the entire period. Before rotating around the west limb on 01 April, Region 745 (N12, L=345, class/area, Dai/190 on 25 March), was the largest sunspot group on the disk, but decayed to an area of plage late in its life cycle. The remainder of the disk and limb were quiet and stable.

Solar wind data were available from the NASA Advanced Composition Explorer (ACE) spacecraft during most of the summary period. Solar wind speed ranged from a high of near 600 km/s early on 28 March to a low of near 325 km/s midday on 03 April. The period began on 28 March with solar wind speed near 600 km/s and the IMF Bz fluctuated +/- 6 nT as a recurrent coronal hole wind stream rotated out of a geoeffective position. For the remainder of the summary period, wind speed slowly declined and the IMF Bz did not fluctuate much beyond +/- 5 nT.

No greater than 10 MeV proton events were observed this period.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit reached high levels 30 March – 02 April.

The geomagnetic field ranged from quiet to minor storming. Isolated periods of active to minor storm conditions were observed at higher latitudes midday on 30 March while isolated active conditions were observed early on 30 March and again on 01 April. Otherwise, the period was dominated by quiet to unsettled conditions.

Space Weather Outlook 06 April - 02 May 2005

Solar activity is expected be at very low to low levels.

A greater than 10 MeV proton event is not expected.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be at high levels 06 - 08 April and again on 22 - 25 April.

The geomagnetic field is expected to range from quiet to active levels. A recurrent coronal hole high speed wind stream is expected to produce unsettled to active levels on 06 April. On 21 - 23 April, a small coronal is expected to produce unsettled to active conditions. Otherwise, expect quiet to unsettled conditions.

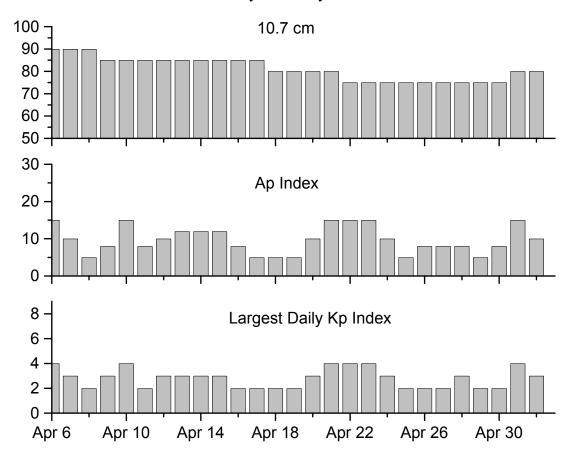

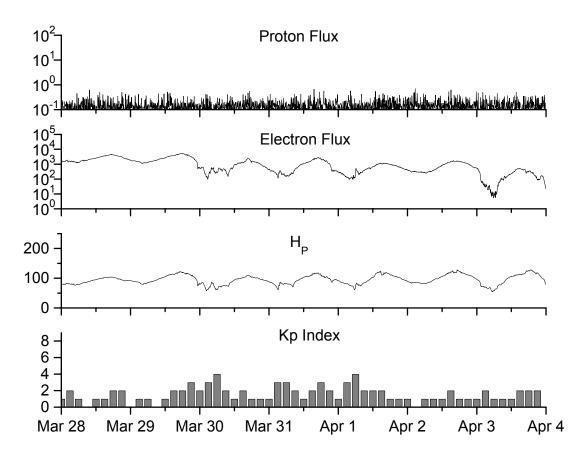

Weekly Geosynchronous Satellite Environment Summary Week Beginning 28 March 2005

Protons plot contains the five-minute averaged integral proton flux (protons/cm²-sec -sr) as measured by GOES-11 (W112) for each of three energy thresholds: greater than 10, 50, and 100 MeV.

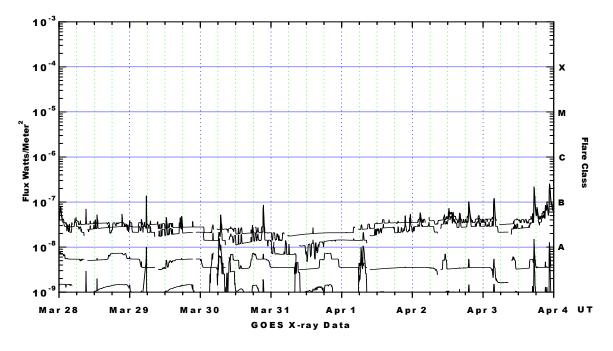
Electrons plot contains the five-minute averaged integral electron flux (electrons/cm² –sec –sr) with energies greater than 2 MeV at GOES-12 (W75).

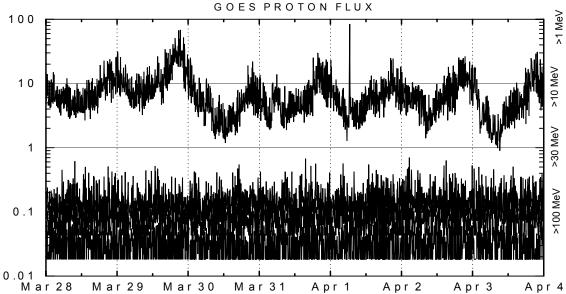
Hp plot contains the five minute averaged magnetic field H - component in nanoteslas (nT) as measured by GOES-12. The H component is parallel to the spin axis of the satellite, which is nearly parallel to the Earth's rotation axis.

Kp plot contains the estimated planetary 3-hour K-index (derived by the Air Force Weather Agency) in real time from magnetometers at Meanook, Canada; Sitka, AK; Glenlea, Canada; St. Johns, Canada; Ottawa, Canada; Newport, WA; Fredericksburg, VA; Boulder, CO; Fresno, CA and Hartland, UK. These data are made available through cooperation from the Geological Survey of Canada (GSC), British Geological Survey (BGS) and the US Geological Survey. These may differ from the final Kp values derived from a more extensive network of magnetometers.

The data included here are those now available in real time at the SWO and are incomplete in that they do not include the full set of parameters and energy ranges known to cause satellite operating anomalies. The proton and electron fluxes and Kp are "global" parameters that are applicable to a first order approximation over large areas. H parallel is subject to more localized phenomena and the measurements generally are applicable to within a few degrees of longitude of the measuring satellite.







Weekly GOES Satellite X-ray and Proton Plots

X-ray plot contains five-minute averaged x-ray flux (watts/m²⁾ as measured by GOES 12 (W75) and GOES 10 (W135) in two wavelength bands, .05 - . 4 and .1 - .8 nm. The letters A, B, C, M and X refer to x-ray event levels for the .1 - .8 nm band.

Proton plot contains the five-minute averaged integral proton flux (protons/cm² –sec-sr) as measured by GOES-11 (W112) for each of the energy thresholds: >1, >10, >30 and >100 MeV. P10 event threshold is 10 pfu (protons/cm²-sec-sr) at greater than 10 MeV.
