Space Weather Highlights 13 March – 19 March 2006

SEC PRF 1594 21 March 2006

Solar activity was at very low levels. Several low level B-class flares were produced by new Region 862 (S07, L=299, class/area, Dai/090 on 19 March). Since first appearing on the disk on 18 March, Region 862 showed steady growth both in spot count, areal coverage, and magnetic complexity.

No greater than 10 MeV proton events were observed this period.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit was at high levels on 19 March.

Geomagnetic activity ranged from quiet to major storm levels at middle latitudes, while quiet to severe storm levels were observed at high latitudes. Solar wind speed ranged from a low of about 350 km/s early on 14 March and a high of near 675 km/s early on 19 March. The period began with the solar wind speed around 400 km/s as a coronal hole high speed stream was moving out of geoeffective position. Solar wind speed slowly decreased to 350 km/s by early on 14 March, while the IMF Bz did not vary much beyond +/- 3 nT. The geomagnetic field responded with quiet conditions. On 15 March, the solar wind speed increased to approximately 560 km/s with the IMF Bz fluctuating between +10 to -7 nT. Mostly quiet to unsettled conditions were observed through early on 18 March. Early on 18 March, a recurrent coronal hole high speed stream moved into geoeffective position. Solar wind speed increased to around 600 km/s with the IMF Bz varying between +/- 11 nT. The geomagnetic field responded with active to major storm periods at middle latitudes, while high latitudes experienced minor to severe storm periods.

Space Weather Outlook 22 March – 17 April 2006

Solar activity is expected to be at very low to low levels with an isolated chance of moderate activity until 25 March when Region 862 is due to rotate around the west limb.

No greater than 10 MeV proton events are expected.

The greater than 2 MeV electron flux at geosynchronous orbit is expected to be at high levels on 22 - 25 March and 16 - 17 April.

The geomagnetic field is expected to be at quiet to unsettled levels for the majority of the period. From 14 - 16 April, active to major storm conditions are expected due to effects from a recurrent coronal hole wind stream.

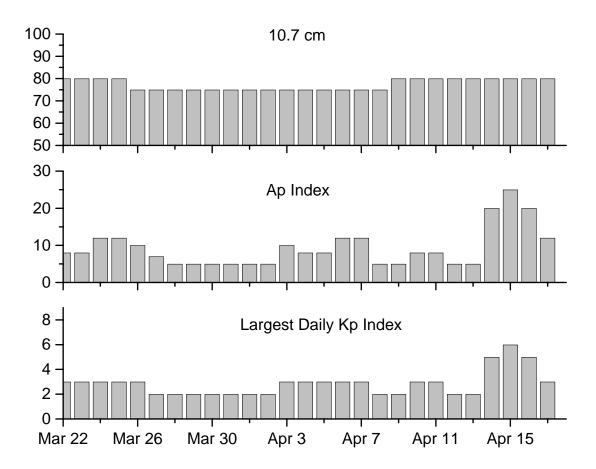

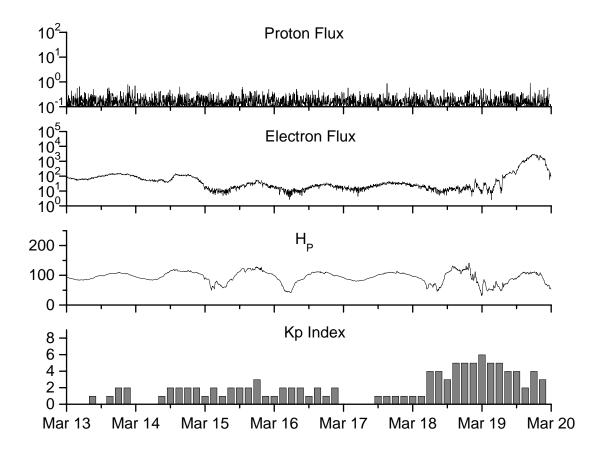

Weekly Geosynchronous Satellite Environment Summary Week Beginning 13 March 2006

Protons plot contains the five-minute averaged integral proton flux (protons/cm²-sec -sr) as measured by GOES-11 (W105) for each of three energy thresholds: greater than 10, 50, and 100 MeV.

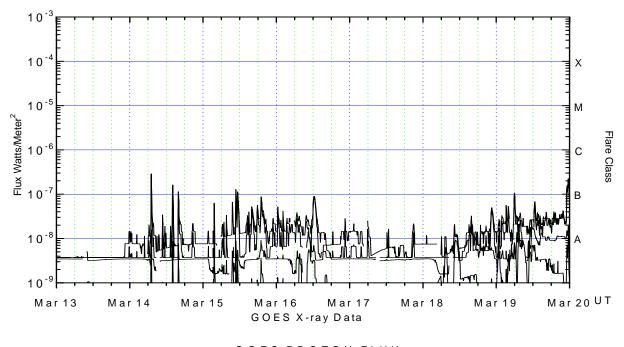
Electrons plot contains the five-minute averaged integral electron flux (electrons/cm²-sec -sr) with energies greater than 2 MeV at GOES-12 (W75).

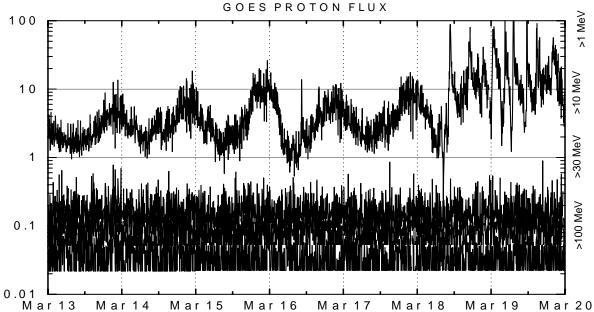
Hp plot contains the five minute averaged magnetic field H - component in nanoteslas (nT) as measured by GOES-12. The H component is parallel to the spin axis of the satellite, which is nearly parallel to the Earth's rotation axis.

Kp plot contains the estimated planetary 3-hour K-index (derived by the Air Force Weather Agency) in real time from magnetometers at Meanook, Canada; Sitka, AK; Glenlea, Canada; St. Johns, Canada; Ottawa, Canada; Newport, WA; Fredericksburg, VA; Boulder, CO; Fresno, CA and Hartland, UK. These data are made available through cooperation from the Geological Survey of Canada (GSC), British Geological Survey (BGS) and the US Geological Survey. These may differ from the final Kp values derived from a more extensive network of magnetometers.

The data included here are those now available in real time at the SEC and are incomplete in that they do not include the full set of parameters and energy ranges known to cause satellite operating anomalies. The proton and electron fluxes and Kp are "global" parameters that are applicable to a first order approximation over large areas. H parallel is subject to more localized phenomena and the measurements generally are applicable to within a few degrees of longitude of the measuring satellite.







Weekly GOES Satellite X-ray and Proton Plots

X-ray plot contains five-minute averaged x-ray flux (watts/m²⁾ as measured by GOES 12 (W75) and GOES 10 (W136) in two wavelength bands, .05 - .4 and .1 - .8 nm. The letters A, B, C, M and X refer to x-ray event levels for the .1 - .8 nm band.

Proton plot contains the five-minute averaged integral proton flux (protons/cm² –sec-sr) as measured by GOES-11 (W105) for each of the energy thresholds: >1, >10, >30 and >100 MeV. P10 event threshold is 10 pfu (protons/cm²-sec-sr) at greater than 10 MeV.
