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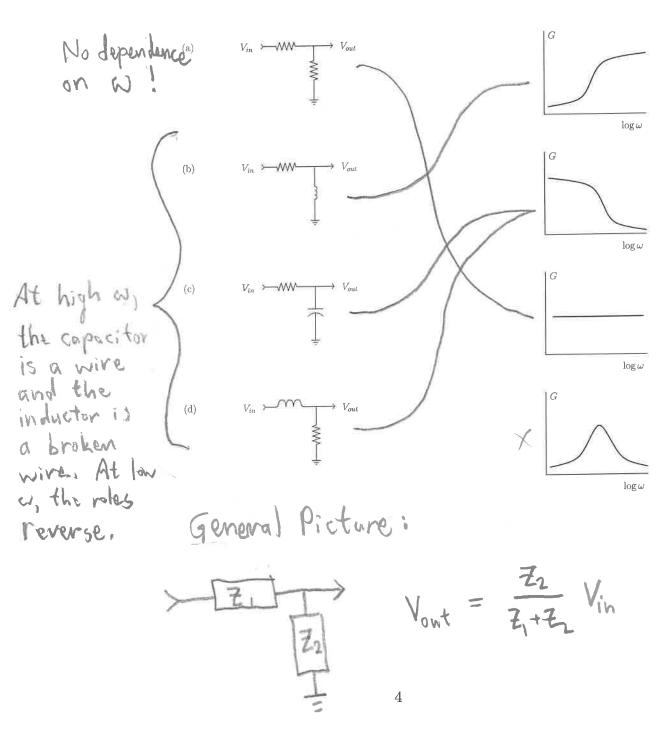
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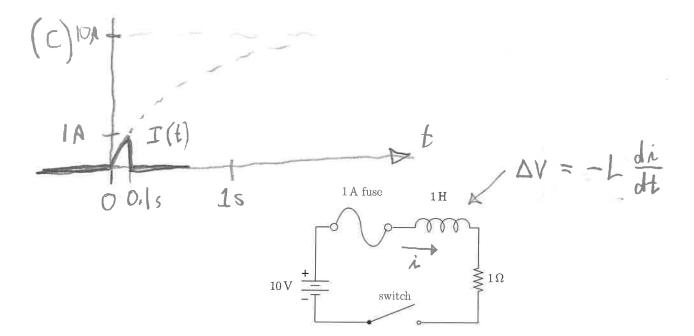
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3. (12 points) Choose the correct gain function for each circuit. There may be duplicates.





- 7. (15 points) At time t = 0, the switch is closed. As soon as the current reaches 1 A, the fuse will "blow", which means that the conductor will melt, breaking the circuit (until that happens, the fuse acts as a wire).
 - (a) Write the current i(t) for the inductor, assuming the fuse hasn't blown yet.
 - (b) At what time does the fuse blow?
 - (c) Sketch i(t) from t = 0 to a bit after the fuse blows.
 - (d) What happens to the voltage across the inductor when the fuse Soike trying to

(a) KVL:
$$|0V - L \frac{di}{dt} - |\Omega| i = 0$$

$$i(0) = 0 \quad i(\infty) = \text{const} \Rightarrow \frac{di}{dt} \rightarrow 0$$

$$50 \quad i(\infty) = \frac{10V}{10} = 10 \text{ A}$$

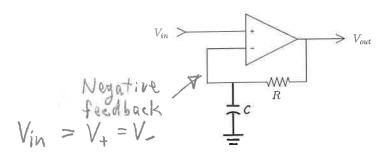
$$7 = L/R = |H/|\Omega| = |s|$$

$$i(t) = [i(0) - i(\infty)] e^{-t/r} + i(\infty)$$

$$i(t) = |0A| (1 - e^{-t/ls}) \Rightarrow \frac{9}{10} = e^{-t/ls} \Rightarrow t = -|s| \cdot \ln(0.9)$$

7. (18 points) Don't panic! Analyze as you would any op amp circuit with negative feedback, and assume the input voltage signal has some frequency ω .



- (a) Find V_{out} as a function of V_{in} and ω .
- (b) Find the magnitude of the gain.
- (c) Find the phase. Does the output voltage lead or lag the input?

$$V_{in} = V_{-} = V_{out} \times \frac{Z_{c}}{R+Z_{c}} = V_{out} \times \frac{-j/\omega C}{R-j/\omega C}$$

$$V_{out} = \frac{R-j/\omega C}{-j/\omega C} V_{in} = (1+j\omega RC) V_{in}$$
(b) $G = |1+j\omega RC| = \sqrt{1+\omega^{2}R^{2}C^{2}}$

$$(c) \quad tan \varphi = \frac{\omega RC}{1}$$
