

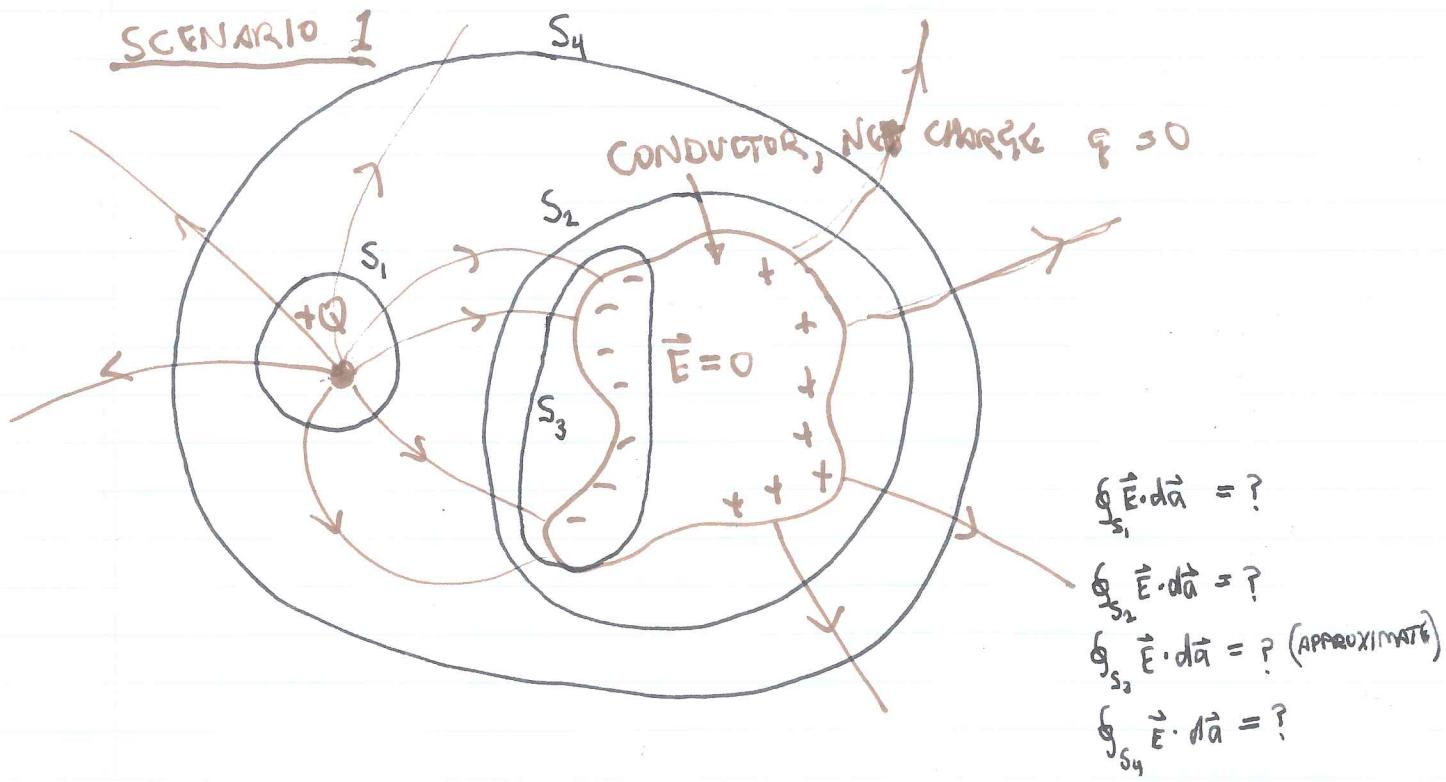
CONDUCTORS GRIFFITHS §2.5

CONDUCTORS (EVEN POOR CONDUCTORS LIKE THE HUMAN BODY) HAVE FREE CHARGES THAT MOVE IN RESPONSE TO ELECTRIC FIELDS. ONCE THOSE CHARGES FIND A STATIC FORCE BALANCE, THEY STOP MOVING. AT THAT POINT, $\vec{E} = 0$.

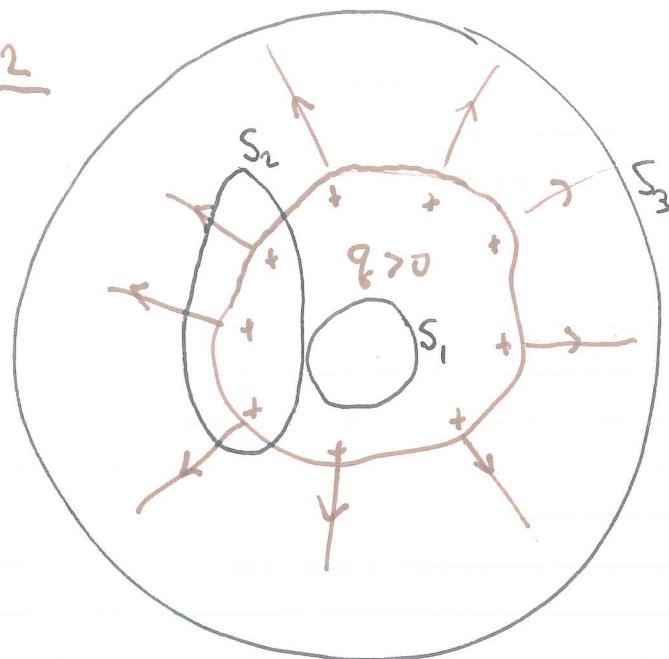
CONSEQUENTLY, IN ELECTROSTATICS, ALL CONDUCTORS OBEY SOME SIMPLE RULES:

- $\vec{E} = 0$ INSIDE.
- $\rho = 0$ INSIDE, BECAUSE $\vec{E} = 0 \Rightarrow \nabla \cdot \vec{E} = 0$.
- $V = \text{CONSTANT}$ (EQUIPOTENTIAL)
- $\vec{E} \times \hat{n} = 0 ; \vec{E} \cdot \hat{n} = |E|$. (USE $\oint \vec{E} \cdot d\vec{\ell} = 0$ AT BOUNDARY)
- ANY BUILD-UP OF CHARGE WILL BE ON THE SURFACE ($\sigma \neq 0$).

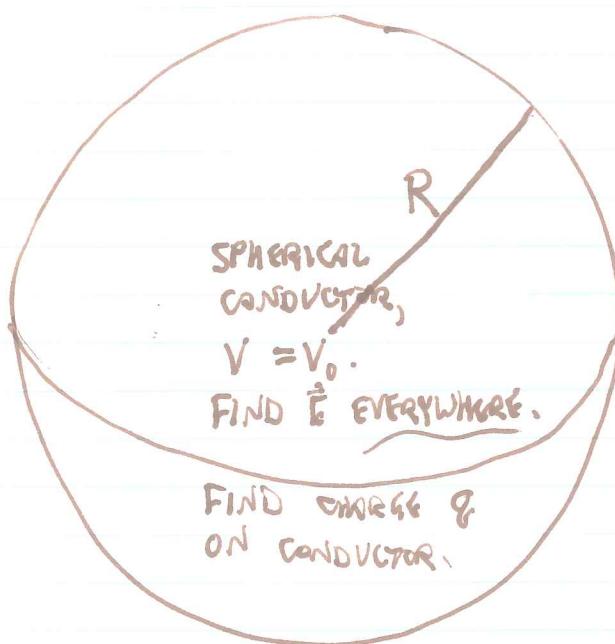
→ THESE RULES HOLD EVEN IF THE CONDUCTOR HAS A NET CHARGE.

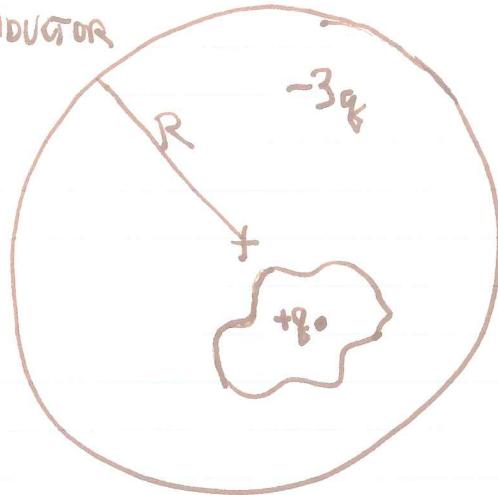

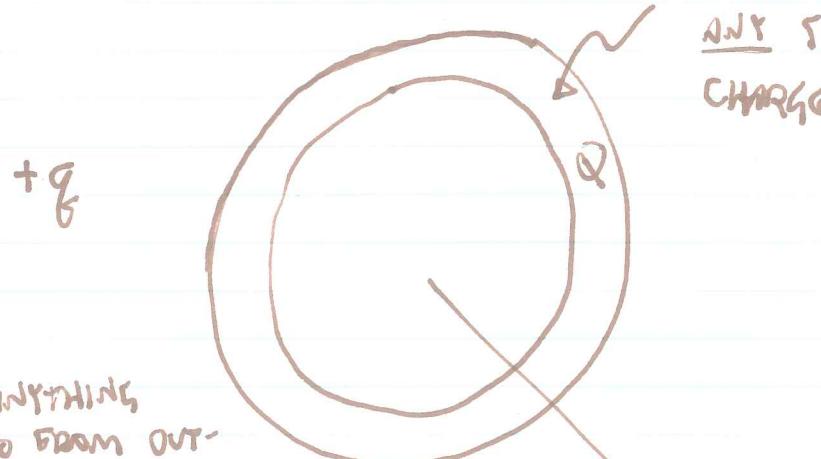
- SPHERICAL CONDUCTOR,

- SKETCH THE SURFACE CHARGES & FIELD LINES.
- FIND THE TOTAL CHARGE ($\$ \sigma da$) ON THE INSIDE SURFACE OF THE CAVITY
- FIND THE CHARGE ON THE OUTSIDE SURFACE OF THE SPHERE
- FIND \vec{E} FOR $r > R$.

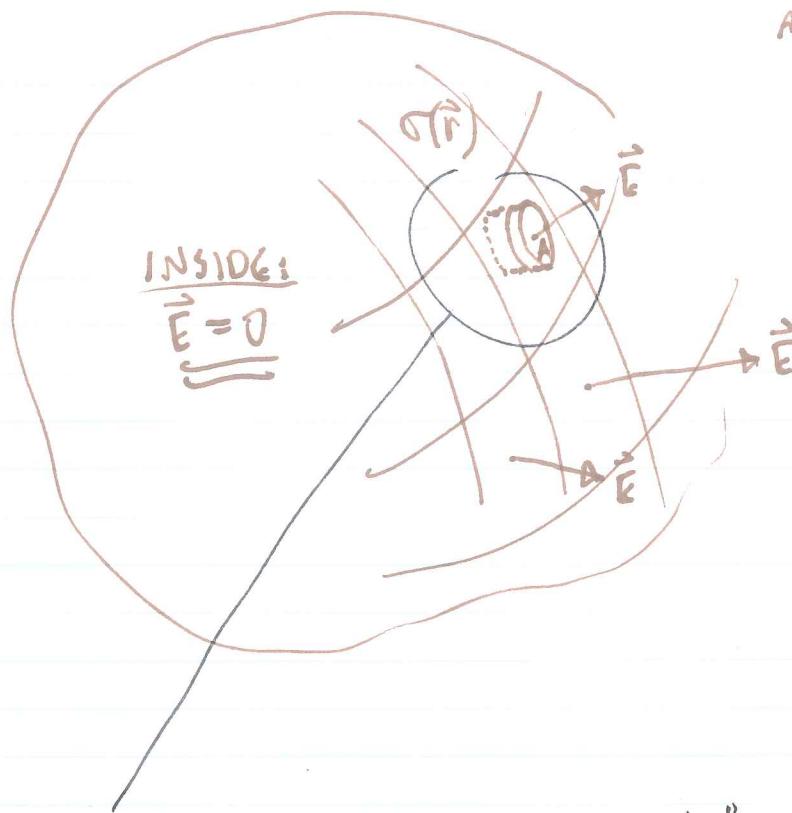


CONDUCTING SHELL,

DISCUSS FARADAY CAGE CONCEPT

THE SURFACE OF A CONDUCTOR HAS CHARGE DENSITY $\sigma(\vec{r})$, VARYING OVER THE SURFACE.



$$\text{ASSUME } \vec{E}(\vec{r}) = E(\vec{r}) \hat{n}$$

$$\epsilon_0 \vec{E} \cdot d\vec{a} = E(\vec{r}) A$$

$$\delta_{\text{ENG}} = \sigma A$$

$$\vec{E}(\vec{r}) = \frac{\sigma(\vec{r})}{\epsilon_0} \hat{n}$$

THE TRICK IS TO ASSUME A GAUSSIAN "PILLBOX" WITH AREA A , SMALL ENOUGH THAT $\sigma = \text{const.}$ OVER THAT AREA, AND ALSO THE SURFACE IS FLAT SO $\hat{n} = \text{const.}$ AND $\vec{E} = \text{const.}$
