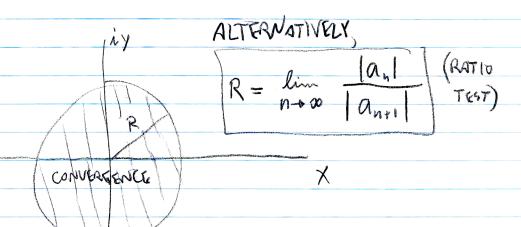

## \$24.6 SINGULORITIES & ZEROES OF P(Z)

SINGULARITY: ANY POINT WHERE F(Z) 15 NOT ANALYTIC.

IF THE SINGULARITY IS CONFINED TO A POINT IT IS CALLED AN ISOLATED SIMPLY CARTY.

- Q: FOR INZ, THE ORIGIN IS A SINGULARITY. IS IT AN ISOLATED SINGULARITY?
- A: NO. IT IS A BRANCH POINT, AND low & IS ALSO NOT AMALYTIC AROLF THE BRANCH CUT.
- : BRANCH POINTS ARE NOT ISOLATED SINGULARITIES.
