


Introduction

- •Studying the relationship between magnetic fields and coronal emission is one way to approach the coronal heating problem
- •Study by Fisher et al. (1998) showed relationship
 - Spans 2 orders of magnitude
 - Showed power law index of 1.19
- Pevtsov et al. (2003) showed relationship
 - Spans 12 orders of magnitude from quite sun to very young stars
 - Showed power law index of 1.15



From Fisher et al. (1998). Used Yohkoh/SXT and HSP (Haleakala Stokes Polarimeter) magnetogram data.

Relationship between X-ray luminosity and magnetic flux





Relationship between X-ray luminosity and magnetic flux

Introduction

- •Recently, Yoshimura et al. (2024) identified the cutoff magnetic field strength (Bc) as a key parameter in influencing the power-law relationship
- Focused on Full Sun region
- Used Hinode/XRT and SDO/HMI data





Objective


- •We will expand the dataset to include XBPs and ARs utilizing data from Hinode/XRT and SDO/HMI
- •Detailed analysis on the power-law relationship and the parameters dependency between XBPs and ARs

Relationship between X-ray luminosity and magnetic flux



Methods


- •Use composite images (Takeda et al., 2016) from Hinode/XRT data over a span of 13 years
- •Select XBPs and ARs using two different thresholds of X-ray intensity in the Thin_be filter
- •Calculate temperature (Te) and emission measure (EM) using the filter ratio method mainly using Thin_be and Al_poly filters
- •Synthesize the X-ray spectrum and Integrating from 2.8 to 36.6 Å to determine the X-ray luminosity



XRT Thin_Be image taken on 2024/03/01. The selected areas are shown on the maps with contours

Methods


- Project selected regions from XRT onto HMI data
- Calculated the total unsigned magnetic flux




XRT Thin_Be image (left) and HMI magnetogram (right) taken on 2024/03/01. The selected areas are shown on the maps with contours.


- Graph of X-ray luminosity vs Magnetic flux
- Covered 5 orders of magnitude
- Covers between the lower XBP and upper AR


Relationship between X-ray luminosity and magnetic flux






- We fitted data points above 10²¹ Mx (red line) to derive power-law index
- Figures top-down, Bc 10, 150, and 300 G
- With increasing Bc index decreases slightly







- Testing different parameters
- Changing threshold
- Changing Filter Pairs (FP)
- No significant change



40 DN/sec, FP of Thin_be and Al_poly, Bc of 10 G




50 DN/sec, FP of Thin_be and Al_poly, Bc of 10 G




40 DN/sec, FP of Thin_be and Al_mesh, Bc of 10 G

- •Looking at magnetic flux below 10²¹ Mx
- •Expanded selected regions in HMI data by ~10"
- •Lower end different distribution could be caused due to data selection process





40 DN/sec, FP of Thin_be and Al_poly, Bc of 10 G

- Power-law index was raised slightly
- Overall trend is similar





Expanded selected regions in HMI data

Discussion

- •Data points below 10²¹ Mx shows different trend. This could be caused by data selection bias
- •Comparing results with Yoshimura et al. (2024) the change of the power-law index in our study is smaller
- •Fisher et al. (1998) reported a power-law index of 1.19 and Pevtsov et al. (2003) reported a power-law index of 1.15 while ours was able to cover the same region with increasing Bc
- •The general trend of the power-law index appears to be decreasing with increasing Bc regardless parameters chosen but its rather stable staying around 1

Future of Project

- Consider projection effect between XRT and HMI images
- •Integrate over a different wavelength range for X-ray luminosity
- Check solar cycle dependency
