## **Our Motivation**

Eccentricity is a natural result due to perturbation > Little literature considering binary WD eccentricity > More physical models can help us better prepare Help Lane develop the skills necessary to do contemporary astrophysics research

Part 1 - Investigate the SNR of eccentric WD binaries over a large parameter space to quantify the detectability of such systems (This Talk)

Part 2 - Model the WD confusion noise coming from a galactic population of binary WDs assuming different eccentricity distributions

## Methods

All coding done in Python Libraries include Numpy, Scipy, and MatPlotLib > Grounded in previously established literature Write some codes and do a lot of math

## Road-map

End Goal: Calculate the SNR for systems across the orbital frequency and eccentricity parameter space

> We want only resolvable systems. Need to filter.

To calculate SNR we need to first calculate the system strain and LISA instrumental noise

# **Evolution Trajectory of Systems**



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## Resolvability

Ratio over 5 years ( $\Delta v$  / frequency resolution)



Resolvable Systems Only



# Calculating g(n,e)

Relative Power Rediated into a Harmonic by Eccentricity



$$\dot{E}_n = \frac{32}{5} \mu^2 M^{4/3} (2 \pi \nu)^{10/3} g(n, e)$$

$$g(n,e) = \frac{n^4}{32} \left\{ \left[ J_{n-2}(ne) - 2eJ_{n-1}(ne) + \frac{2}{n} J_n(ne) + 2eJ_{n+1}(ne) - J_{n+2}(ne) \right]^2 + (1-e^2) [J_{n-2}(ne) - 2J_n(ne) + J_{n+2}(ne)]^2 + \frac{4}{3n^2} [J_n(ne)]^2 \right\}$$

# Calculating h(c,n)

MBH and CO Strain on Detector by Harmonic



$$h_{c,n} = (\pi D)^{-1} \sqrt{2\dot{E}_n / \dot{f}_n},$$
  
$$\dot{E}_n = \frac{32}{5} \mu^2 M^{4/3} (2\pi\nu)^{10/3} g(n,e)$$

## **The LISA Noise**



#### **Instrumental Noise**

#### **WD** Confusion Noise

Only considers circular orbits

## **SNR Investigation**

Total SNR for Harmonics 1-20

v (Hz)





## **SNR Investigation**

SNR for All but 2nd Harmonic



Total SNR range from ~2 to ~1000

These Harmonics are the 'smoking gun' of eccentricity.

Almost the entire parameter space should be detectable

## The ODEs

- > Orbital Frequency
- Orbital Eccentricity

### Post-Newtonian terms don't contribute significantly

$$\frac{de}{dt} = \frac{-e}{15} \left(\frac{c^3 \mu}{GM^2}\right) \left(1 - e^2\right)^{\frac{-7}{2}} \left(2\pi \frac{GM}{c^3} \nu\right)^{\frac{8}{3}} \left[ \left(304 + 121e^2\right) \left(1 - e^2\right) \left(1 + 12 \left(2\pi \frac{GM}{c^3} \nu\right)^{\frac{2}{3}}\right) - \frac{1}{56} \left(2\pi \frac{GM}{c^3} \nu\right)^{\frac{2}{3}} \left((8) \left(16705\right) + (12) \left(9082\right) e^2 - 25211e^4\right) \right] + e \left(\frac{c^3}{GM}\right) \left(\frac{c^6 S}{G^2 M^2}\right) \cos \lambda \left(2\pi \frac{GM}{c^3} \nu\right)^{\frac{11}{3}} \left(1 - e^2\right)^{-4} \left[ \left(\frac{1364}{5}\right) + \left(\frac{5032}{15}\right) e^2 + \left(\frac{263}{10}\right) e^4 \right]$$
